TORONTO, Feb. 11—Ontario is beginning to regard the University of Toronto senior basketball team as a powerful contender for the provincial championship. Should it emerge victorious, the Blue squad will be one of the strongest eastern challengers to western court supremacy in years, some cage observers believe.

The Varsity, coached by Lew Hayman, former University of Syracuse star who was an All-American forward in 1930, hasn't lost a game on Canadian floors this season. In the Big Six League, opposed by St. Catharines, Toronto Aberies, Toronto Danforth, McMaster University of Hamilton and Toronto West End "X", varsity has won seven straight games and in its only intercollegiate tilt this season the Blue team swamped its ancient enemy, Queens.

A late December four-game tour of American colleges saw the squad break even with two wins and as many losses. One of the Toronto wins was over the always-strong University of Buffalo team.

Hayman, a well-built, dark-haired young man, is a great lover of sports and a good friend of Warren Stevens, director of athletics at the University of Toronto. Stevens and Hayman used to play together at Syracuse University and both starred at football and basketball.

Lew comes from down New Jersey way and was first heard of around Toronto when he helped coach the Varsity Intermediate football team in an intercollegiate title in 1932. Next season he coached Argonauts, leading the Scourers to the Canadian championship. During the basketball season he started coaching the Blues and revived interest in the hoop game around the campus. Last fall he coached Argonauts, helped Varsity football squads and when the cage season opened he gathered his scrawny army.

Unlike their fellow-students who prefer to play hockey in the winter—and just don't seem to get anywhere—Toronto's senior basketball team this year is headed for a Dominion title, some critics predict.

St. Michael's College crack team of last season was broken up and four of their star players joined Varsity. The four are Huggie Marks and Don Meagher, forwards; Joe Connolly, a guard, and Leo Crowley, centre. Marks, Meagher and Connolly and all formerly of Rochester University and Leo Crowley comes from Syracuse. Others on the team are Phil Gold and "Red" Gordon, guards of Toronto; centreman Alex Munro, also of Toronto; two Queen City forwards, Bill Brodus and Irwin Levy; Norm Newman of St. Catharines, another forward, and guard Joe Mencil, who in Windsor and is playing his first year of basketball for the Blues.

Coach Hayman believes in a man-to-man defensive system of play and when on the attack mixes his plays up with a "grapevine" and "revolving-hole" offensive. Lew believes basketball is a coming game in this province. Gates have been larger this season and more publicity given the game, he says.

Senators Lose Star Centreman

CLOSE RACE FOR SCORING HONOURS

Five Tied For Third Place With 30 Points—Conacher Leads League.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Feb. 11—While Charlie Conacher, giant right winger of the Toronto Maple Leafs, still dominates the National Hockey League official scoring sheets, the main fight centres around second and third positions in the lists issued here tonight.

Conacher tops the scoring with a total of 39 points made up of 21 goals and 18 assists. Harvey "Bush-er" Jackson, left wing of the Toronto Leafs, and Frank Boucher, veteran centre of the New York Rangers, are tied for second place with 34 points. Boucher who heads the American division was in front last week but on the weekend Jackson caught up. Jackson has amassed 20 goals and 14 assists while Boucher has tallied 10 goals and 24 assists.

Third place in the scoring lists finds five tied with 30 points. The American division candidates are the Detroit line of Herbie Lewis, Larry Aurie and "Cooney" Weiland, Dave "Sweeney" Schirmer and J. Chapman, of the New York Americans, in the International Section also have 30 points.

The Toronto Maple Leafs and the New York Rangers forged over the 100 mark in goals scored. The Leafs have a total of 107 while the Rangers have 101. Red Horner, of the Leafs, leads the penalty parade with 88 minutes with Irwin Frew, St. Louis's husky defence-man, close behind with 81 minutes.

Along The Sidelines

READY AND EAGER for the fray, Abegweits packed their kits last night and this morning leave for Halifax for the fifth game of the playoff series, a series that has turned out to be one of the most bitterly fought in Maritime hockey circles in years. That the locals have turned out to be a surprise packet after the loss of several outstanding players is readily granted.

STAD HALLFANS FANS, taking the outcome for granted at the start of the series, are now convinced that if the Wolverines are to escape elimination they will have a mighty tough battle on their hands to down an Island crew that just won't concede defeat. Wednesday's game will be the turning point in the series and Island fandom, thrilled to the core by the stirring fight being put up by the "Men of Grass," have every confidence that the team will come through.

BUT THE FANS are not the only ones to be gaining confidence. The players themselves are just at this stage, but by no means are underestimating the task that lies before them. CLAIMS FOUR MINUTE MILE IMPOSSIBLE

University of California Track Coach Names Three Potential "Perfect Records."

(By Alan Gould Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, Feb. 11—Such human athletic objectives as the four-minute mile, the nine-second "100" and a seven-foot high-jump never will be achieved in athletic competition, in the belief of Brutus Hamilton, University of California track coach.

Hamilton's conclusions, based upon the first scientific research into the ultimate in track and field records and published in the February issue of the Amateur Athletic, the official organ of the United States Amateur Athletic Union, answer some of the questions which have been agitating sports experts for years.

Hamilton's chart lists three potential "perfect records" as follows: 100-yard dash—9.13 seconds (present world record 9.4 seconds by Frank Wykoff).

One mile run—4:01.66 (present record 4:06.7 by Glenn Cunningham). Pole vault—15 feet, 1.08 inches (present record, 14 feet, 4 3/8 inches, by William Graber).

In explanation, Hamilton says: "My own mathematical calculations are simple. The real work was done by the Finnish mathematicians and physicists who devised the new decimal scoring table (to be used in the 1936 Olympics). They made the difficult energy, expectancy and fatigue graphs; they applied the evasive mathematical laws dealing with physiological compensation; the writer simply carried their work a step further."

The two greatest world records now on the books, in the opinion of Hamilton, are the time of 46.2 seconds for 400 metres, made by Bill Carr of Pennsylvania in the 1932 Olympics at Los Angeles, and the shotput mark of 57 feet, one inch made by Jack Norman, Louisiana State, at Oslo, Norway, last August. These are considered "perfect records" by Hamilton.

Mounties Defeat St. Joseph's

The game which was one of the most sparkling exhibitions of the winter pastime ever staged in the college arena here, was witnessed by a large crowd of supporters of both universities.

The Blue Eagles controlled the play throughout the first two periods when they rang in their only two goals. In the third period the Mounties rallied their forces and went on a scoring rampage which led the scoring before the period was half ended. Five minutes later English, speedy forward ace of the visiting line of attack, staged a spectacular solo expedition into the enemy goal zone and whipped a high one into the net which clinched the game.

Gaudet, Callahan and Busger were outstanding performers for the local squad, while Dickie, Robertson and English were the pick of the invaders.
