A depth of four hundred and forty feet was reached with the eighteen inch drill, and work has been begun with the thirteen inch. A total depth of six hundred feet has been reached.

It says: "Miss Daisy Trace was an excellent swimmer and was swimming in the current while her sister kept nearer the bank, but in an attempt to swim out to her sister, she got into the swift running current which caused her to lose her balance and not being a good swimmer grasped for her sister. The water at this point is forty feet deep and runs quite rapidly and in the struggle both sisters went down before assistance could be summoned. Help was at once secured from the chain works but all efforts to recover the bodies were fruitless.

Chief of Police Crawford, who was phoned for had a launch and grappling irons soon on the scene and the river was dragged for a considerable distance but without avail.

The place where his accident occurred is perhaps the most dangerous point on the river. From the bank of the river there is a gradual slope of fifteen feet and then a sudden drop of thirty feet. It was practically at this same spot where Charles Forkin and a Mrs. Taylor and daughter lost their lives.

The deceased ladies were born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, Bertha being 29 and Daisy 21 years old.
