Everybody longs to be happy. Few people try to be consistently cheerful in other words, the majority long for something to be given by outside force, and neglect the way to get it for themselves. For to be consistently cheerful is the dynamic way to be happy. Inconsistent cheerfulness is of no especial value. To be cheerful because one is enjoying life is a matter of course. Consistent cheerfulness is another and a braver matter. It means, first, a firm belief that God is good and that all things work together for good to His obedient children. It means, secondly, a determination to be courageous and helpful and pleasant-tempered at every moment and under all conditions. Cheerfulness must have backbone, or it collapses at the first crisis. But with backbone, it becomes second nature, an unspendable improvement on the original. True cheerfulness may be called voluntary happiness. By the great psychological law of reflex action, the outward smile (forced to the lips perhaps by sheer will power at times) reflects itself in the inner soul like a ray of sunshine from a prison, and dances in the heart, even on a wall of difficulty. It is impossible to keep outwardly cheerful, day after day, without becoming inwardly happier in the end. By being cheerful, one comes to be happy. They belong together. One can have both—or neither—as one chooses. "Isn't it wonderful she can be so serene and lovely," we hear it said often, "when she has such terrible trouble in her life?" But there is nothing marvellous about it. It is the working of cause and effect. To resolve to be cheerful through all events is within the power of every child of God, and it leads on to peace and sunshine of soul on earth, and for ward to the glorious happiness of heaven. NO LAWYER OFFERED TO DEFEND MAN WHO SHOT AT KING. ROMÉ, October 8.—The trial of Anzoni Dalba on the charge of attempting the assassination of Victor Emmanuel on March 14 began today before the assizes court here. As no lawyer had offered to defend the would-be regicide the presiding judge appointed Enrico Ferri, the socialist leader, to act as the prisoner's counsel. This was done, not because of Ferri's political faith but because he is regarded as one of the highest authorities of criminology. During his detention in prison awaiting trial, Dalba has thrice attempted suicide. He has denounced several men as accomplices and has endeavored to prove that his attempt on the king's life was the result of a plot, but investigation has shown that his denunciations were imaginary. WEALTHY OIL OPERATOR KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT. BRENTFORD, Ont., October 8.—Charles Bisnett, a wealthy oil operator, who has been for some time residing at the Belmont, accompanied by Charles Herod, proprietor of the Herod garage, drove his automobile into a freight train at terrific speed early this morning. Bisnett was thrown head first against a freight car and was instantly killed. Only a few days ago Bisnett was fined in the police court for speeding. A MYSTERY DRINK THAT KILLS MEN IN CAROUSAL. ST. MALO, Que., October 8.—Two men are dead and three dying as the result of a prolonged carousal in the house of a doctor, and of a mysterious drink which the physician is alleged to have mixed for the party. Joseph Desrocher, A. Desrocher, P. Lemieux, Joseph Quillette and Gen-dreau had been drinking heavily and exhausted their supply before they were ready to break up. It was then according to the reports which are current, that the doctor made up a drink, of which the five partook. The ill effects became manifest on Sunday when all five were found to be in a critical condition. Joseph Desrocher and P. Lemieux died yesterday afternoon and today small hopes are entertained for the recovery of their companions. St. Malo is near Cook-shire, on the line of the Maine Central railway, and it is said that the doctor has fled to the United States.

WASHINGTON PIE.

Cake—Two cups of flour after sifted, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoons cream tartar, little salt, sift all together. Break 1 egg in measuring cup, fill with milk, stir well into your mixture. Now add 3 tablespoons of melted butter. Bake about 20 minutes. Filling—Two cups cold coffee (I had left from breakfast), heat and add 2-3 cups sugar, 2 teaspoons cornstarch, 2 teaspoons cocoa, 2 teaspoons butter, all well blended with a little cold coffee. Cook in your hot coffee until it thickens.
