FORMER BANKER WOUNDED—A Charlottetown lady at present visiting in Scotland, writes home that while visiting the Craiglockhart Hospital in Edinburgh, she saw among other Canadian wounded officers there, Lieut. Ralph Eaton, of the 26th New Brunswick Battalion. Lieut. Eaton was formerly in the service of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Charlottetown. He is a native of Nova Scotia and joined the 26th as a private in the spring of 1915. He was promoted on the field last autumn to sergeant and later to lieutenant. He was badly wounded having been buried three times and receiving a severe gunshot wound and injury to his spine. He is reported to be progressing favorably and hopes to return to the front.

COMPULSORY SERVICE FOR WOMEN.

London, Jan. 23.—(Compulsory National Service for women and men is overshadowed in the regulations, which require every passport to require permission of the National Service Commission, which body has power to veto any person of either sex between the ages of sixteen and sixty leaving Great Britain. The result may be that no women fit for manual work may be allowed to emigrate to Canada. Canadians domiciled will be exempt but the regulation threatens to seriously interfere with emigration of domestics to Canada.

Mrs. Bowder who intended opening a girl's club in Montreal in the spring expresses the opinion that Canada should object to the proposal especially as women emigrating to Canada mostly go to farms where productive work is seriously hampered on account of the scarcity of female labor. Obed Smith, Commissioner of Emigration for Canada, is taking the matter up. Curiously enough the head of the National Service Commission is W. T. R. Preston, formerly Emigration Commissioner for Canada.
