The teachers of the Bridgetown Study Group met in Bridgetown School on Thursday, April 11, at 4.30 p. m. Five teachers and one visitor were present. An interesting chapter from Kennedy's Fundamentals in Methods was read by Miss Jessie Acorn. Miss Mary Lathard was appointed to give an assignment lesson on Geography and Miss George Dingwell to prepare a paper on Arithmetic for the next meeting which will be held on Thursday, April 25, in Bridgetown School, at 4.30 p. m. After a discussion on matters relative to school work the meeting was concluded.

This year a new and important innovation was established by twenty-five of the Company's Executives coming East instead of the Sales Staff going to Toronto and Montreal. pointing out, by quotations from the public accounts, certain errors might have been avoided.

The Minister of Public Works, he said, was doing very good work in his own department. If the people can foot the bills, let him go to it.

The speaker scored the Government for its failure to pay over any portion of the railway grant to incorporated towns—as promised before the election. Possibly the plank was only put in the platform to induce this City to elect two Liberals.

With regard to the Sanatorium, speaking as a member of the Medical profession, he hardly thought the stay of patients in the institution would be as short as two weeks. The medical men, he felt would co-operate in every way with the Superintendent. The late government were severely to be criticized for their failure to obtain compensation from the Dominion Government for additions to the Dalton Sanatorium made during war-time. He recounted the story of the failure to accept the cash settlement of \$100,000 offered.

If it is possible, as is said, to reopen the question, it should be done. The Bell Government, too, had always declined to vote a cent for the Red Cross Society. The Stewart government gave them a grant of \$2,500.00, and in the last years of their regime increased it by \$1000.00. Not all the credit of this work should go to the Provincial Health Officer. The Red Cross Society, the Women's Institutes, the Tuberculosis Society and the Medical Profession have long been working for a Sanatorium.

Dr. MacMillan then refuted statements by Government members that the Stewart Government had neglected to collect arrears of taxes.

PROHIBITION

The speaker then dealt with what he called "the Heart and Soul of the Government—Prohibition." His hon. friend from Rustico (Mr. B. W. LePage) seemed to be the dictator in this matter.

Dr. MacMillan went on to tell Hon. Mr. LePage and Hon. Dr. MacNeill in regard to their statements about Prohibition and Government Control. The government's political principles are stronger than their prohibition principles, he said. And the enforcement was very bad. The arrests for drunkenness in 1928 in Charlottetown and Summerside are greater than they have been for years. As a result of Prohibition, respect for law is decaying among us. He scored the government severely, saying that the act is now a farce and terming them "the biggest law breakers of the crowd," for the act provides that twice a year the Prohibition Commission must pay over to the government all monies in their possession in excess of \$200.00—and they flout this provision. They also fail to present any temperance education in the school. He asked Mr. LePage if he thought the government was enforcing the act, to which the latter replied "Yes."

He combated strongly an assertion by Hon. Dr. MacNeill, that the articles in regard to prohibition were paid propaganda, making mention of "Notes by the Way." He would not make such statements if the respected writer of "Notes by the Way" were here in the house.

BORROWING

Dr. MacMillan pointed out that the indications were that they were borrowing more money this year. If, instead of making fresh borrowings, they would take it from where it is, in the offices of the Prohibition Commission, it would be far better for them. That is one reason why we need an external audit. We should get it even yet.

HON. W. B. BUTLER'S ADDRESS

Mr. Butler, (4th Kings) after expressing the universal feeling of relief at the happy recovery of His Most Gracious Majesty, paid a tribute of respect to the memory of Marshal Foch, as also to the memories of distinguished ex-members of the House who had passed away.

The speaker then voiced his pleasure at the able way in which the Minister of Public Works had placed, in so detailed and thorough a manner, the activities of his department for the past year before the public.

Referring to his district, the hon. gentleman stated that he and his colleagues tried to get all they could for it. He said that the idea that they had got more than their share of gravel was baseless, as was shown by the Public Works report, and went on to deprecate certain fault finding as to the use of gravel in Murray River, by opposition members. He went on to explain the circumstances of the case. The Women's Institutes had undertaken to improve the sidewalks; they did get a little gravel for the purpose; he had helped them to get it, and considered that he would have fallen short

EDUCATION

The speaker explained that, in the matter of teachers' salaries, he was not able to support any measure which would bring about increased taxation. Such a demand was, at the time, most inopportune.

The House took recess at 6 p. m.

EVENING SESSION

The House met at 8 p. m. Hon. W. B. Butler in resuming his address reviewed the expenses in education, showing that they had increased from year to year. Teachers' salaries had also increased.

"So, when my hon. friends opposite find fault with the way we have dealt with the Federation's demands," he said, "they are wrong."

He went on to combat the statement of the senior member of Charlottetown, saying that, if the teachers cannot exist today on the salaries they receive, they could not have existed with the salaries under his regime. He should have remedied this.

Dr. MacMillan: "You'll remedy that when you are premier."

Mr. Butler went on to say that the teachers were receiving just as much as the government could afford to pay them. No doubt, if the subsidy is increased the Government will pay them a larger salary as it had promised. But he, personally, could not see his way to support salary increases for them, when such meant increased taxation.

Mr. Butler then launched into a description of the schools of his boyhood days. At that time in his school there were 60 pupils under one teacher. "You would not find that condition today," he said. He was in favor of doing all that could be done for the teachers, and for education, provided the people were not taxed thereby.

PUBLIC WORKS

The large power machines had done a wonderful work during the past season. One road that was a cow pasture had been made into a boulevard. Of course, such roads need to be pieces to some extent in the fall, but in the spring they will only need to be dragged to put them in good shape.

PROHIBITION

"We have heard many speeches on prohibition," said Mr. Butler. "My hon. friends opposite stick to the policy of Government Control. They may be right and they may be wrong. That is not for me to say; that is for the electorate to say in July next. I want to tell my hon. friends that when that time comes the people are going to have a chance to say whether they were satisfied with the present Prohibition Act or not; whether they want Government Control, or not. I will say this, that if the people want Government Control, why, they will certainly get it, and it will be Government Control. It will be kept well under control by the present government, if they ask for that. The senior member from Charlottetown sits and shakes his head. I don't know why."

Dr. MacMillan: Who will be boss, you or your friend next to you?

Hon. Mr. Butler: We have been called prohibition candidates in the past. I think perhaps some people call us the prohibition members at the present time.

Dr. MacMillan: Not now! (Applause.)
