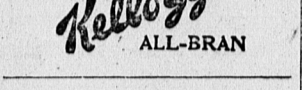

Are Planning To Promote Co-Operation

TORONTO, May 8.—Planning to promote co-operation in Maritime industry with a view of meeting large Ontario orders, R. W. Burnaby, Maritime trade commissioner for Ontario and Professor E. D. McPhee, president of the Maritime Provinces Association are leaving Toronto on a business trip to New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island on Saturday of this week.

In an interview this morning Professor MacPhee stated that many of the maritime industries were operating on a small scale and necessarily producing in small quantities.

As a result when any big order from an Ontario house comes through the commissioner's office at Toronto in some cases they are unable to cope with them.

He stated it was his hope and Commissioner Burnaby's that they would be able to secure the co-operation of the governments, business men and various organizations in the three provinces to promote co-operation in the various industries with a view of meeting the large orders when they came.

He stated an announcement to this effect would probably be made within the next ten days.

Further Professor McPhee stated that Commissioner Burnaby anticipated trebling the tourist traffic by car and rail from Ontario to the Maritime Provinces this year.

He pointed out that up until 1922 most of the province's tourists were drawn from the Eastern States.

This year he believed there will be a greater number than ever from Ontario and while in the provinces Commissioner Burnaby will endeavor to confer with the various tourists agencies.

He has had already many inquiries. Professor McPhee speaking of the Ontario office pointed out that it was opened on February 1st, 1929, it was anticipated that only Mr. Burnaby and a secretary would be necessary to run it. Today the volume of inquiries regarding Maritime Provinces ran into the thousands per month and arrangements were being made to handle over fifty types of Maritime produce.
