Livestock

MONTREAL, July 2 (CP)—The daily market report of the Livestock Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture stated: Steers were 25 cents higher. All other classes of livestock firm. Good steers were mostly \$8.50 to \$9.50, medium \$7.25 to \$8 and common \$4.25 to \$5. Canners and cutters \$3 to \$4. Bulls \$4 to \$6 common selling up to \$5.25. Calves were steady to strong. Good veals made \$8 to \$8.50 with medium kinds from \$7 to \$7.50 and common light veals down to \$6. The bulk of the veals sold between \$6 to \$7. Drinkers ranged from \$4.75 to \$5.75 with the bulk between \$5 and \$5.25. Yearlings \$3.50 to \$4.25. Good ewes and wethers were \$11 with \$1 per hundredweight cut on buck lambs and \$2 per hundredweight cut on cull lambs. Several lots were sold on a fat basis at \$10. Sheep were from \$3.50 to \$5.50. The bulk of the bacon hogs were \$8.60 fed and watered with a couple of loads at \$8.65, and up to \$8.75 of trucks. Sows drew \$1 per hog premium with the regular cuts off grades. Sows were from \$4.50 to \$5.25. Hogs sold on rail grade brought \$11.40 with an odd sale up to \$11.50 hot weight.

FINANCE

By Frederick Gardner Associated Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, July 2 (AP)—War, business or political stimulation was again lacking in today's market and leading issues clung to a slim area in desultory dealings. Most Canadian issues showed fractional gains. DeSillers Seagram, Dome, Walkers, Ford, Hollinger and Imperial Oil were the gainers while Lake Shore lost a fraction. Transfers amounted to 320,000 shares compared with 272,920 the day before. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 40.9. The apathetic performance was exemplified by the fact only 571 individual issues changed hands during the five hours. In the half-hearted forenoon rally gains ran to a point or so for favorites. These were clipped down or erased in many cases, at the close. Holding modest advances were N. Y. Shipbuilding, Electric Boat, Penn-Dixie Cement, Leew's, Loft, Woodworth, Great Northern, Santa Fe and Consolidated Edison. Unchanged to lower were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, U. S. Rubber, Douglas Aircraft, Amsec, American Telephone, Westinghouse and American Can.

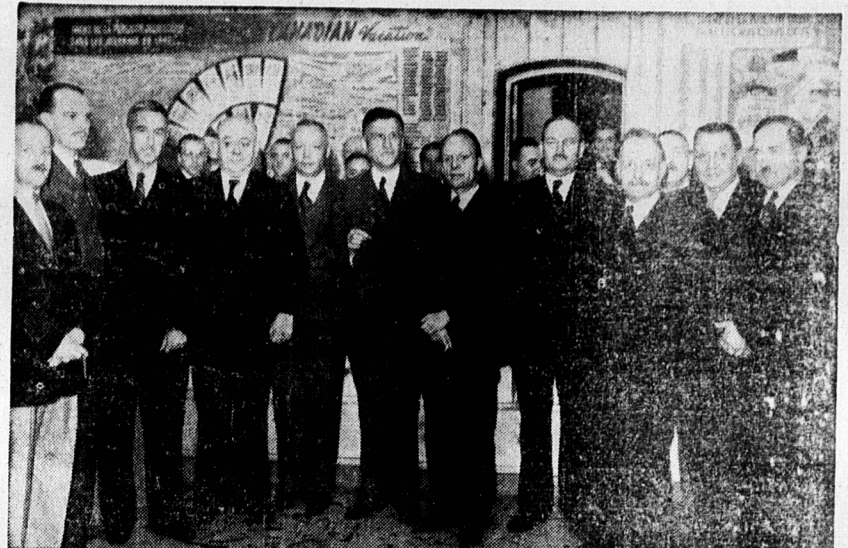

Millionaire Sentenced For Evading Tax

CHICAGO, July 1 (AP)—M. L. Annenberg, who made millions in publishing, racing news and real estate enterprises, was sentenced today to three years in prison for evading income taxes, but he remained free pending a court ruling on his plea for suspension of the penalty. The defendant, grave and nervous, cupped his right hand around his ear while federal judge James H. Wilkinson pronounced judgment. Annenberg then slumped back in his chair. He seemed dazed. His son, Walter, placed a comforting arm about his shoulder. Together they walked to a window and gazed out at the city in which Annenberg began his rise in the world of high finance. Defence counsel Weymouth Kirkland quickly filed a petition for probation and suspension of the sentence. The judge agreed to stay execution of the penalty for 20 days and announced that he would rule on the request for clemency before that time had expired. Annenberg's original \$100,000 bond was allowed to stand. The petition for probation set forth that Annenberg was 63 and "not in good health"; that he had never been convicted of crime; that he had a substantial net worth in the indictment was due primarily to "inadequate and inexperienced" bookkeepers; that he had agreed to pay the Government \$8,000 and interest in settlement of civil tax claims; and that his family was "absolutely dependent" upon the continued operation of his businesses.

Defence Of Singapore Made Ready

SINGAPORE, July 1 (CP)—The defence of Singapore, Britain's great far eastern naval base, and of British Malaya generally, are being backed by a highly organized state of preparedness because of the general situation in the Orient. It was officially announced tonight that a British statement said "demonstration of obstacles on the south coast of Singapore" and "erection of barbed wire entanglements" were in progress. It added that these preparations are merely the normal military precautions necessary at the present time. Japanese troop movements around Hong Kong, the island of Hainan, the South China coast, and Japanese demands for having war supplies movements to Chinese British territories, the Chinese army have aroused anxiety. Collapse of France and German occupation of the Netherlands have increased the interest of Japanese expansionists in French Indo-China and the Dutch East Indies.

Annenberg, publisher of the Philadelphia Inquirer, magazines and sports periodicals and former ruler of a nation-wide turpentine empire, pleaded guilty April 23 to evading \$1,217,296 in taxes on his 1936 earnings. That constituted one count of a six-count indictment alleging failure to pay \$3,542,284 in taxes on his 1932-36 income. It was the largest criminal tax case against an individual in United States history. United States District Attorney William J. Cagney reported that the remaining cases against Annenberg, involving other tax matters, lottery charges and conspiracy to influence a grand jury witness—would be dismissed.
