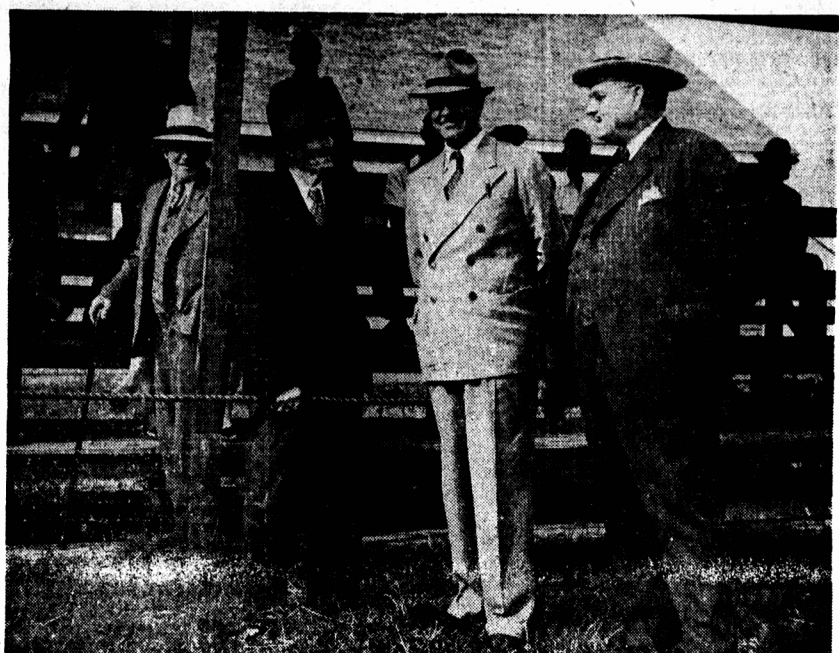


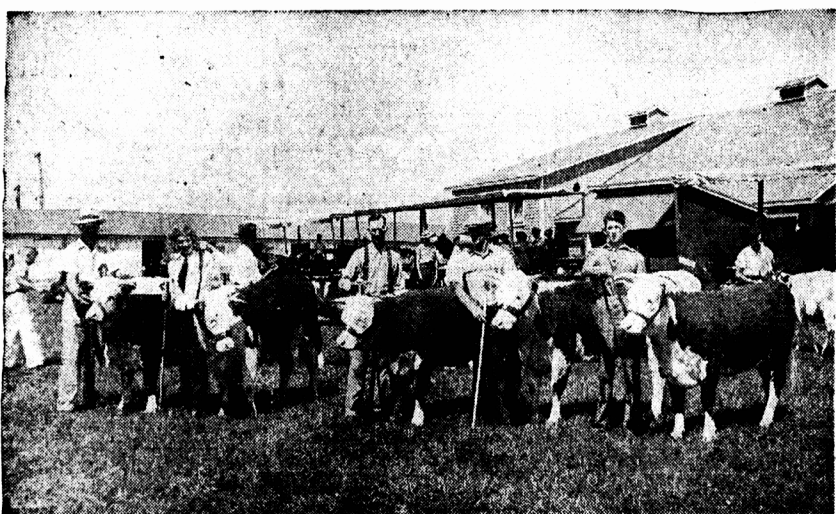
The Governor-General At Exhibition Opening



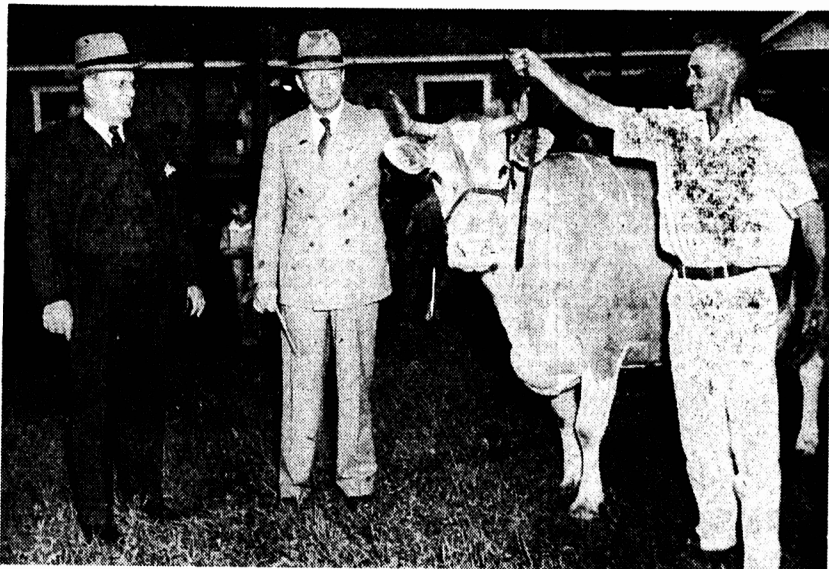

Top Flight Canadian Marksman Barred

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES,
South March, Ont., Aug. 16. —
(CP) — A top-flight Canadian marksman — Maj. Fred J. Goodhouse of Ottawa — has been barred for life from Dominion of Canada Rifle Association matches for rules violation.

A member of six Canadian Bisley teams, the 48-year-old reserve officer is automatically disqualified from further competition in the empire shoot.

Maj. Goodhouse's disbarment, for an infraction of firing rules in the King's medal event of the annual D.C.R.A. shoot here Friday, created a sensation on its announcement Saturday.

Col. R.J. Birwhistle, D.C.R.A. secretary, said that only once before in the long history of the association had there been a life disqualification. It happened 10 years ago in the same match and under almost identical circumstance.

In the King's Medal, the firing is at five different distances, competitors firing two shots at each range and then running 100 yards to the next one to get away their shots in a 45-second time limit.

Col. Birwhistle said Maj. Goodhouse got away the right total of shots but did not fire the regulation two from each distance.

At his home in Ottawa, the disbarred officer Saturday admitted he had failed to fire two shots at one stage but said he was handicapped in getting over the 100-yard runs by disabling himself in the first world war. Serving with the 38th battalion in that war, he came out with leg and arm wounds.

Besides losing his future chances at Bisley, for which competitors must qualify in D.C.R.A. shoots, Maj. Goodhouse was barred from the remainder of the D.C.R.A. meet and must return the \$62 in prize money he had won before Friday in last week's meet.

He is expected to appeal the sentence.
