Medical aid was at once summoned and the child taken to the Highland View Hospital, where death ensued in the early evening. The mother, burned in attempting to save the child, is now under medical care.

WHERE PEOPLE WASH IN MUD.

Batavia lingers in the memory as a place of noise, writes Dale Collins, the Australian writer, who recently visited Java. Here, he continues, they have a street train which is known as "the tea kettle train," for its engine is dressed and is nothing more than a vacuum flask which is filled with steam at each end of the run. If the train is smokeless, it lives up to Java's reputation for noise. It goes on its way clanging bells and whistling, and all about it speed motor-cars with horns which never cease their song and little jaunting cars which jangle bells. Perhaps it is well that Java likes noise. Otherwise in these crowded streets there would be many accidents, for the "Keystone police"—small natives in blue uniforms armed with large batons—make but a feeble effort at control.

Through the centre of the city runs a brown canal which really is a river hedged in by walls. In its muddy waters women stand all day washing clothes, which by some magic they make passably white by beating upon the stone steps. Another mystery is how the people wash by pouring mud over themselves. They do it in this canal, they do it in gutters along the roadside, they do it in the water of rice fields. I should never be surprised to learn that the Javanese were white originally, but have washed themselves into their present hue.

Java is never quiet. Birds, lizards, and unknown mysteries warble at night from the man-vanished banyan trees, "boys" hold shrill discourse in the echoing corridors, and from the street comes the never-ceasing clamor of traffic. And at sunrise you would be sure the entire population is sharing the hotel.

ONE OF THE AFRIDI WAS OBLIGING.

Inspecting officers, as a general rule, love to find fault, and if, when inspecting a regiment, they fail to find at least one man with a duty bottom, it worries them badly.

No one, it is said, ever minds being "told off" in this way. Certainly no Tommy ever bears malice. But on one occasion this fault-finding was taken very much to heart by an Afridi member of the famous "Guides" Regiment.

The Lieutenant Governor of the Punjab was inspecting them one day, and, as usual, found a fault here and there. Sir George Younghusband, who tells the story in his introduction to the newly published "Exploits of Asaf Khan," Lumsden (who commanded the regiment, and was idolized by his men) was sitting in a chair in his garden, smoking a pipe before he went to bed. Out of the corner of his eye he saw standing silent, awaiting his notice, one of the men of the regiment, an Afridi. Turning round, he said, "Hullo, Yakub Khan, what do you want?"

"Sahib, at the inspection today, I and others of my comrades noticed that the Lord Sahib spoke words that were displeasing to your Honor and that your Honor's face became black. Now the Lord Sahib travels by road tomorrow to Peshawar; but there is no reason whatever why he should arrive there!" He often told this story afterwards to Viceroy and war lords who came to inspect the regiment—generally to their huge delight.
