Yes My Dear Friends, today we can see the true Irish Mother with her children around her, listening with rapt attention and with throbbing hearts as she again relates that wonderful story of St. Patrick in Ireland. of money comes from the automobile bill, and we do not know just how permanent it is going to be. But however permanent it will be, the fact remains that by expending it upon the roads, we have withdrawn it from current revenue. I believe the people of this province will disagree with the statement made by the speaker of the address before the House (Mr. LePage) about the condition of the public roads last year. Despite the fact that they have not, they have not for many years been in such a condition as last year. They were absolutely neglected and in many places they remained almost impassable. They used to be a great outcry raised about the way we were attending to the winter roads. This year I think the winter roads have been very badly neglected—as badly as at any time in the history of the province—and for this I do not think the Department of Public Works can take any credit.

ridicule and even the unlawful and unfair weapon are brought into force to discredit the church of Christ and crush out the faith of St. Patrick from our midst.

Let us turn then to our Patron Saint not as an object or an occasion for uttering unmeaning sentiment, but turn to him as a model to be imitated; turn to him as a benefactor still of the Irish nation; pray that he may watch over the church which he himself has planted, that he will protect her through the storm and tempest which it may be still her destiny to bear, that he will guard her children from seduction and Apostasy and that whenever their lot may be cast his spirit may hover around them, his maxims may ever guard them, his example may ever encourage them, his reward may ever crown them. Teachers' Salaries.
The present government is not the first to increase the teachers' salaries, though one might imagine from listening to the address before the House, Mr. LePage, friend who seconded the resolution (Mr. LePage) declares that the government paid \$75,000 more for education last year than in 1919. I would like to draw his attention to the fact that the increase made by the Matheson government was \$50,000 and that that increase will be practically the same ratio to the total amount previously paid as the present increase to the total amount paid in 1919; so that the increase made in 1919, so that the increase we had made is proportionately the same—but with this difference: WE PAID THE INCREASE WITHOUT INCREASING TAXATION. In securing an increase, simply by increasing the taxes, this government has taken a line of policy that anybody could see, if not too conscious of it, is quite true that in 1919 when the change of government came the teachers were under a bad spell that a salary effort had been in the number of teachers, but we must be reasonable and seek the explanation for this, which is not far to find, in the unprecedented conditions of the war. A large number of teachers, on account of the war, had been drawn away from their professions and employments all over the world. And further than that, the cost of living increased beyond measure and precedent, so that salaries, ample and satisfactory in 1916, were totally inadequate in 1919. The present government undertook to meet these conditions at the time in a straightforward, manly fashion. I will not discuss the merits or demerits of the act they passed, but I will say, that having seen the necessity of paying the teachers an increase of salary, they went before the people in an open-handed manner and said: "It is necessary to increase our teachers' salaries and we propose to levy an Educational Tax which will be set aside for that purpose and which will be used only for the purpose for which it is collected." This was submitted to the people and the people turned it down. That is a matter of history now and shall not be discussed further than to say that in my opinion, but for the attacks made upon it by certain parts of the press and by men on public platforms, it might very well have been accepted by the people. However, it was not. The present government came into power and they immediately changed their attitude. They had given the people no intimation that they were going to increase taxes to meet the educational demands. In fact, the people know only too well that they stated the very opposite; and it is no use for the Leader of the Opposition to say that his platform contained no promises, because his party are nailed just as solidly to them as if they were in his platform. It was stated on the floor of the House, at the hearings and during the present session, that the revenues of the province were more than sufficient to meet the demands and one of the gentlemen sitting opposite to me was very loud in his contention that if we desired some of the unnecessary officials we had there would be sufficient to pay the teachers the increase they wanted. Upon those representations, or rather misrepresentations, the present government came into power. And herein lies the difference between the policies of the two parties. Whether our policy in this particular instance was right or not, it was straight-forward, consistent and manly. We told the people positively what we intended to do. If we made an error, though this we do not admit it was, at the most, an error in judgment, we did not deliberately deceive the people in order to gain the reins of power!

Right About Face.
And so the Bell government, after preaching economy, found that the teachers were on the verge of a strike. They had to meet this situation and they had to do the very thing that they predicted was not necessary—they levied increased taxes in order to meet the situation. We quite admit that the schools of the province are being filled today. We have the interests of education at heart as much as the members on the government side and we are just as directly interested in the school question. We are glad to admit that practically every school today is filled out, but when we have said that I think we have said practically everything that has been done.

When the government makes the statement that they are raising the standard of education in this province they are making a statement that is not correct. Over a year ago we had that first fiasco, that disastrous affair at Prince of Wales College, when through the bungling, neglect and mismanagement of the government every member of the teaching staff walked out on strike. That strike, and its direct and indirect consequences, affected the standard of education in this province during the whole of last year; because it was not only during the time that the college was closed, that the trouble lasted. The whole college was disorganized and the work was generally affected. The result of the year were not nearly so well trained as they should have been. This year I am informed that they have reduced the standard of matriculation at Prince of Wales College, and this cannot be said to be providing a more efficient class of teachers. The most serious thing we have to face is the extreme youth of those who are teaching. Our schools and day being taught by boys and girls and that condition is being intensified here. We propose to ask for a report of the average age of teachers of the different classes of matriculation in our schools, and I venture to say that the report will show that the average age is very much younger than it has ever been in the history of the province. To lower the standard now means that those who matriculate at Prince of Wales College will start teaching even younger than before and in that way there will be a general lowering of the standard of efficiency of the teaching profession. This I believe is a very serious error; a grave mistake. I have had for some years a splendid record with respect to graduation of Prince of Wales College, who have gone abroad to other universities and have supplied the various professions throughout the Dominion with some of their brightest ornaments. If you lower the standard for those who matriculate you are virtually breaking off the relationship established between the Prince of Wales College and other Universities, and doing an incalculable injury to coming generations of students.
