Provincial Exhibition, Charlottetown, Sept. 27th to Oct. 1st. INCLUSIVE

Train No. 3 for English and intermediate stations which usually leaves at 2.30 p.m. will be held on Tuesday, Friday and Saturday, Sept. 27th, 30th and Oct. 1st, until 6.20 p.m. No. 3 train will leave Charlottetown on Wednesday and Thursday, September 28th and 29th, but instead a special train will leave Charlottetown for English and intermediate stations on these dates at the same hour viz 6.20 p.m.

No. 5 train for points East which usually leaves at 3.10 p.m. will be held on Tuesday to Saturday, September 27th to October 1st, inclusive until 6.40 p.m. connecting with train No. 7, which will be held at Mt. Stewart for Georgetown and intermediate stations on same dates.

THE MARKETS

FARNHAM, September 20.—At the meeting of the Eastern Townships Dairymen's Exchange ten packages offered, 408 packages creamy butter, of which only one factory sold at 35 1/2c per lb. At the same date last year 290 packages sold at 57 3/8c to 57 1/2c per lb.

ST. HYACINTHE, September 17.—The offerings on the local market were 200 packages butter, 400 boxes cheese. The butter sold at 34 3/8c per lb., and the cheese at 14 1/2c per lb. A year ago 200 packages butter sold at 56 1/2c per lb., and 350 boxes cheese at 24 1/4c per lb.

CORNWALL, Ont., September 20.—On the cheese board on September 1999 boxes were offered, made up of 112 white and 1387 colored. The white sold at 17c and the colored at 16 1/2c. Secretary Melchior stated that the railway companies were tentatively planning to increase the freight rates on cheese from 10c to 12c per cwt. on the 1st of October. He also stated that the railway companies were not meeting the requirements and were live shippers to get their goods with properly boxed before being sent forward. Mr. Melchior was instructed to write the Department in an endeavor to have manufacturers make boxes of one more size.
