SUDDEN DEATH AT EIMSDALE A very sudden death occurred at Eimdsals on Wednesday last. Mr. Amos Adams, a brother of the postmaster at Eimdsals, was taking his bath about seven p. m. when he expired in the bath loft.

He was at once removed to the open air and efforts were made at resuscitation but without avail. Mr. Adams was a man of about fifty years of age and was much respected in the community. The extreme heat and over-exertion was no doubt the cause of death.

In Memoriam On July 13th a gloom was cast over the parish of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Richmond Hill, Long Island N. Y. when it was announced that the Angel of Death had visited the family of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph K. Kenny and removed from their midst their bright, promising and eldest son Thomas Joseph, 16 years old. All through life this exemplary youth enjoyed excellent health. The world smiled upon him and the prospect of a brilliant career in the great world were encouraging.

June 27th dawned and he showed signs of unusual fatigue. Suddenly his strength began to fail and his devoted parents deemed it prudent to call in the Physician. When the latter arrived he found that he had an attack of Spinal Meningitis.

He was immediately conveyed to Jamaica hospital. The first few days, however, did not withstanding skillful medical treatment and tender nursing he succumbed to his fatal ailment on July 13th, thus terminating his short career by what is popularly termed an untimely death. Possessed of a kind and cheerful disposition, Thomas J. Kenny endeared himself to all young and old. Here we may rightly use the words of a poet.

"To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die."

The special characteristics of those apparently too short a life were those which are most needed in the youth of today: A respect for authority that amounted to reverence and prompted a reciprocal feeling in those who loved him; his loving parents docile and obedient.

With his companions he was always kind and courteous. And never was he known to use an unkind or unmeaning word. He was in every respect, a "good son" who who whose practice of Religion. He was a frequent recipient of the Holy Table and extraordinary piety and gracefulness in serving at the altar won the admiration of everybody.

For four years he held the distinguished privilege of being an altar boy in the Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. 'Twas in the sanctuary of this sacred edifice that the sentiments of his young heart were poured forth to his Lord and Master with the simplicity of a child.

In this connection it must be remarkable that he found special pleasure in being present at all the ceremonies of the church, and won the highest esteem and respect of the Rev. Clergy. To all appearances it cost him nothing to comply with regulations. Yet a careful study of the character of this exemplary child.

child showed that all his docility and kindness were the outcome of a strong will that determined him to be faithful to every detail of duty. As to manners he was always a model politeness and good taste. He was always prompt to forgive and if he had inadvertently offended he was not one of those who stand upon their dignity and lay down conditions of forgiveness. When the news of his death became known it produced a profound impression upon all, who frequently visited by the Rev. Francis J. Canning, who like an Angel of Mercy administered to his spiritual wants. Needless to assert, his death bed scene was a tranquil one his soul being fortified by the rites of Holy Mother Church, a few days before his flight to the Great Beyond.

At his bedside stood his devoted parents uttering the Prayers of the signs and the pure, beautiful orison "My God my God take me home to Thee. O heavenly Father agonizing and with that beautiful drawn sighs and the pure, beautiful soul of Thomas J. Kenny abandoned its earthly tenement and flew to that resting place to which it had often risen in prayerful accents the bosom of its God. The funeral took place from the church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help on Monday July 16th where a solemn requiem Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul by the Rev. Stephen A. Cuddeback, Rev. Fathers Walsh and Gullmett being deacon and sub-deacon. A large and respectable congregation filled the sacred edifice.

After the Mass, the large funeral procession which consisted of the hearse and 17 autos bearing sorrowing relatives and friends drove to St. John's cemetery where all that was mortal of the deceased was laid to rest. Thus ending the earthly career of one of the ideal altar boys of Our Lady of Perpetual Help.

The many tributes paid to his memory since his decease. The large gathering that graced his funeral obsequies were eloquent testimonials of his worth to the people of Richmond Hill, sorrowing Father and Mother, three sisters and one brother survive him, besides a large circle of relatives and friends throughout Canada and the United States. May the memory of the honorable and virtuous life just ended sustain and comfort them in the dark hours of sorrow. R. I. P. Peacefully sleeping, resting at last.
