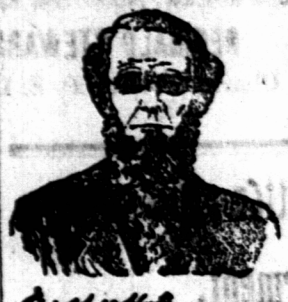

SEAL SKINS AND WRECKAGE FOUND

Hundreds of Skins Being Secured—Life Belt and Brass Rail Picked Up

EVERYTHING POINTS TOWARD SHIPWRECK

Part of a Cabin, Deck Planks, Stairway, etc Found on the Beach. Mr. Gordon Burn's Residence at Lower Free-town Narrowly Escapes Destruction by Fire.

ONE of the men at work painting the Clifton House received a bad fall on Saturday afternoon. A ladder on which he was working slipped and he was thrown on the sidewalk below. He was carried to the Queen Hotel, but besides receiving quite a shock he was not seriously injured.

Mr. WM. S. CAMPBELL's many friends throughout the country will be pleased to learn that he is now convalescent and expected to be about in a few days. It will be remembered that Mr. Campbell while studying at the Theological College at Bangor he was some weeks ago laid aside from work by an attack of typhoid fever.

THE death of Mrs. James Kinsman, formerly of Summerside, occurred in Boston last Tuesday after an illness of only a few hours. Deceased was the mother of Mrs. Alfred Small, of this town, and is removed to Boston last autumn where she resided with her daughter, Mrs. James Barnard. She had previously resided in Summerside where she has many friends who will learn with sorrow of her death. Three sons and four daughters survive her, all of whom with the exception of Mrs. Small reside in Boston. The remains will be brought to Summerside for interment.

THE dwelling house of Mr. Gordon Burns, Lower Freetown narrowly escaped being burned to the ground on Friday afternoon. About two o'clock Mrs. Burns noticed the roof on fire and as she was alone in the house, the men being at work in the field, it was some little time before assistance arrived and the fire made considerable headway, running along the saddleboard and in some places working its way through the roof. There was a heavy wind blowing and much difficulty was experienced in getting the fire under control. As the wind was blowing in the direction of the out buildings they also were in great danger but with the help of some of the neighbors, what would have been a serious fire was averted, though not before a good deal of damage was done to the house. The fire is supposed to have started from a spark from the chimney.

QUITE an interest was aroused in Summerside on Saturday over the report of the finding of about 500 seal pelts on the north side, on the previous day which came ashore during the high winds. While on Curtain Island Mr. John Lyle of St. Eleanors and a number of Summerside young men discovered a lot of seal pelts on and about the driftlogs. The men went to work and gathered in about 300 which they are now having packed in casks for shipment. About 200 pelts were also found on the shore at North St. Eleanors by Messrs. Benj. Tanton, Herbert Mills and others. These pelts have probably drifted away from some of the Newfoundland sealing steamers which have been seal hunting off that coast lately. During the last few days a lot of wreckage has also come ashore on the north side of Curtain Island among which was found a brass rail which by appearance is off some steamer probably wrecked somewhere in the Gulf. Mr. Alexander Waugh, S. Side, also reports having found on the shore of his farm at North St. Eleanors, a part of a cabin which by all appearances is of an old French schooner besides some deck planks, part of a cabin stairway, also a corked bottle with a red and blue ribbon tied around the neck of it, and containing some whiskey. Besides these there were other evidences of the wreck of a schooner. Mr. Waugh was also the lucky finder of 34 seal pelts.
