July 31.—If the plans of a member of the Philippine Chamber of Commerce go forward, New York may have a museum established in its commercial district with every kind of a Philippine product displayed therein and an expert agent from those islands in charge to give information. The new institution would probably be conducted along the same lines as the Manila Merchants' Association and the Bureau of Education in their endeavor to create in the United States a market for Philippine school embroidery. The museum would contain raw as well as manufactured products.

WORLD CELEBRATED REMEMBRANCE DAY

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, August 4.—Today was celebrated in Great Britain, France, Italy, China, Japan and the Dominion of Canada as Remembrance Day, being the 4th anniversary of the day Great Britain declared war on Germany. In London the King and Queen and members of Parliament participated in the morning in a procession to St. Margaret's, Westminster when the Archbishop of Canterbury preached a moving sermon in honor of those fallen in battle.

GERMANS RETIRING TO ANCRE

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, August 4.—The Germans are executing a local retirement to the east bank of the Ancre in the region of Albert on a front of three or four miles according to news received in London today. The German hold on the west bank of the Ancre in this region has been precarious, and it seemed to be tenable only if it were intended to be made use of in the starting of an offensive. The retirement appears to indicate the abandonment of any attempt at an offensive in that quarter at present.

HOUSEHOLDERS ASKED TO SAVE NUT-SHELLS

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, August 4.—Householders, hotel proprietors and restaurants have been asked by the National Salvage Council to save all nutshells and fruit stones, which are urgently required for war purposes. A systematic collection is to be arranged for.

NO OBJECTIONS TO EXPROPRIATION ORDER

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, August 4.—"I have heard of no requests by British and American capitalists for a repeal of the order-in-council passed on March 17th, 1917," said Hon. C. J. Doherty today. "I do not know the source of the Globe information, but no protests against the order-in-council to power to expropriate property has been received from England by the Cabinet. It is possible they may have been made to Sir Robert Borden in London." As far as Ottawa knows the only objector to the order which was passed a year ago last March is Sir Chas. Ross, the former owner of the Ross rifle factory. The order-in-council was passed so as to give the government power to expropriate the Quebec factory of the Ross company.
