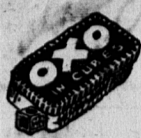

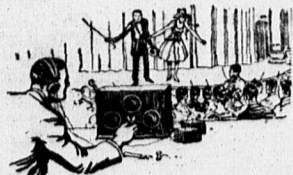

THE FINE NEW STORE of John McGougan, Kensington, built to replace the one destroyed by fire four months ago, is about completed and will be stocked for opening Thursday, December 11th. The building is a two-story flat roof and is built of choice stock, the inside finished in B. C. Fir, with hardwood floors. Spacious plate glass windows admit floods of light to display to the best possible advantage the choicest groceries, sundry wares and shelves. The walls and ceilings are displayed in the natural colors of the material and cast a soft mellowness on the goods so grandly displayed. The shelving and drawers and doors are grained in light oak, the workmanship displaying with full effect the master-hand of the efficient artist, Mr. William Sutherland. Taken all in all, the new store is in every sense superior to the old one that was burned, and Mr. McGougan's ability and popularity will be equally displayed in his new scene of triumph.—Y.

METHODIST CHURCH

Preaching to good congregations, in connection with the Missionary Department of the Methodist Church in Summerside, on Sunday, Rev. W. H. Hertz, D. D., discoursed from the text, "Our Father Who Art in Heaven," stressing both the Fatherhood of God and the resultant Brotherhood of Man. During the sermon Dr. Hertz made interesting personal references. For instance, how well he knew the first Methodist Minister who preached in Summerside and Bedouque, the Rev. John B. Strong, also Mr. Thomas Dawson who before roads and bridges were built walked throughout the island in the intensity of his pioneer work and suffering much exposure he yielded his life after 4 years. Dr. Hertz himself received an invitation to become pastor of Summerside Methodist Church. Answering the question "Do Missions Pay" the preacher emphasized the big response being made by Missions to the Indians, naming two educated Indians, the brothers Steinhauser, who are now doing great work as ministers to brother Indians in Alberta. Then the example was given of work amongst the Chinese—one of whom being wealthy is diverting much of his money to Chinese Mission Work. The pastor, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd in giving the announcements explained this was the last year of Methodism under that name and also that this was the centennial year of Methodist Missions—hence the General Board was acting as a grand finale and a true Thanksgiving for the work of pioneers, \$125,000 of which the N. B. and P. E. I. Conference was asked contribute \$30,000 and Summerside Church \$500. In the evening Dr. Hertz delivered an earnest Evangelistic Sermon from the one word "Inasmuch". The large audience both wondered at the virility and power of the 84 year old preacher and was gripped by his message. (Dr. Hertz is the oldest Methodist Minister in active work in all Canada, commencing his ministry in 1862. He is a native of this province, being born in Charlottetown, and is an uncle of His Honor, Lieutenant Governor Hertz). The choir in both services rendered appropriate and effective music, with Miss J. Strong handling the fine organ in a masterly manner.
