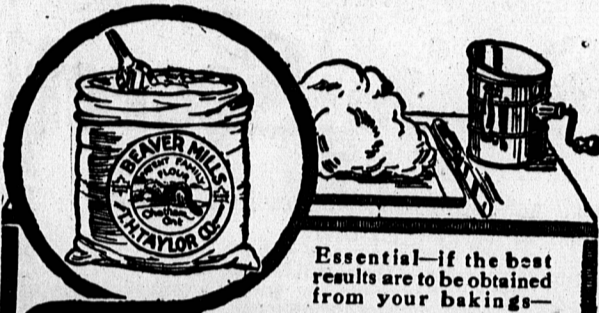

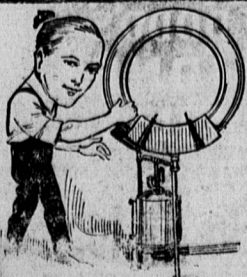

It is also to be observed that the new work has created new difficulties for the winter season when it always becomes necessary for drivers to turn off from the highway into the fields to avoid impassable snow drifts. In some cases this will be more difficult than it was before and in some cases it will be seemingly impossible. How are such emergent conditions to be provided for and met? They are very real and it seems to be a public duty long distance before being able to find a practicable turning place that is not dangerous. It is also to be observed that these also have to meet and pass each other. Frequently the danger is increased by a top-heavy load of hay or straw. There are many places on the improved roads where two loads of hay cannot meet and pass each other without great peril of one or both being overturned.
