Check Up on Careless Mistakes
A little tragic-comedy you often see a young man with an attractive looking girl—but he evades introducing her to his friends.

The reason often is—her English! Will his friends know what a nice girl she really is when they hear her "It's KIND OF cool. I wish I HAD HAVE known."

For even our little mistakes stand out to cultured ears. Though most of us would say correctly "RATHER cool," "I HAD known" there are sure to be unnoticed errors in our speech—a careless BOTH ALIKE REPEAT AGAIN. To be above criticism we should drop unnecessary words, say ALIKE, REPEAT.

the vinegar solution. Bring the whole thing to a boiling point. Pour the heated syrup over the prepared and cut cucumbers and let stand overnight. Next morning, drain off the syrup and heat again to the boiling point and again pour over the cucumbers, and again let stand overnight.

On the ninth day, pack the cucumber chunks into hot sterilized jars, heat the syrup and pour over the cucumbers in the jars and seal at once.

If you like, you can place the finished cucumbers in a sterilized crock, cover them with grape or green cabbage leaves, then cover with the heated syrup. The crock will keep well like this and it is not necessary to seal them. Of course, whether they are sealed or not they should be stored in a cool, dry place.

IF YOU ADOPT A CHILD TELL HIM ABOUT IT IN EARLY LIFE

Don't Keep the Secret From Him Too Long, For it May Turn Him Away When He Learns the Truth From Other Sources

Dear Miss Dix—We have an adopted boy who was as good and respectful as the average boy is to his parents until one of our neighbors found the record of his adoption in our family Bible and called him into her house and told him all about it. Since then—this happened six years ago—he has been uncontrollable. Says we have no right to boss him. It is impudent to us, using vile and insulting language, and seems to have none of the affection that he used to show us. He is now 19, and when he works he makes good money and stays with his friends, but as soon as he is broke he asks us for money. My husband has suffered an accident and will be a cripple the rest of his life, so we need the boy's help, but he refuses it and why should he support us, as we are no kin to him? What should we do?

Answer—There is only one thing to do. Turn the ingrate out of doors and refuse to let him come back and sponge on you when he is out of money. There is nothing to appeal to in the boy. But your case emphasizes again the importance of telling adopted children that they are adopted when they are so young the knowledge does not make any impression upon them. If that is done, they grow up understanding the relationship between them and their foster parents and feel towards them as one does to a tender and loving friend to whom one owes countless benefits.

Answer—Children are not obligatory in marriage. They are merely the little bundles from heaven that go with it, as a general thing, and make it worthwhile, and you can either take 'em or leave 'em, as you please.

But I think you are making a great mistake and throwing away the best happiness that life has to give when you shut children out of your scheme of life. Brush, brush, brush—weld like to say it a hundred times just for emphasis. By brushing with the head and waist bent over, you not only help the waistline, but promote that flow of blood to the scalp which is essential to healthy hair. Even in this weather the experts, who advise the shampoo models, are opposed to shampooing more than once every two weeks. Instead they recommend for daily use a fragrant cleansing lotion, applied to the scalp while the hair is separate strand by strand. This preparation is so effective that it will even repair the nasty effects of salt water in the hair.

There is also a cream for setting the hair, that even after days on the beach you can look as good as new. It's applied a little at a time, rubbed in an oil in the palm of your hand. If you smear a bit on their trick little curl brush you can have almost professional curls in no time.

When painting a room the following hints may be found useful: Don't be in a hurry to finish; put down old newspapers, before work begins; keep handy a rag soaked in turpentine to wipe off "mistakes," start painting in the darkest corner of the room and work toward the light; don't draw your brush—insert it about half an inch; use a piece of stout cardboard with a straight edge to protect woodwork or wall.

Between gardening, cleaning and preserving the housewife has a very hard time keeping attractive hands at this season of the year. Lemon juice in hot water will remove some of those stains around the nails and cuticle better than a sharp file. Use a stiff brush for the purpose. An orange stick the point covered with cotton and then dipped in peroxide, is also a good stain remover. Avoid any sharp instrument as dirt will only fall up the scratches again very quickly.
