JOURNALIST VISITS CITY—An interested visitor to Charlottetown yesterday was Mr. J. R. Hale, editor of the Packet and Times, Orillia, Ontario, who is taking a vacation from his duties by visiting centres of interest in the Maritimes. Mr. Hale, who is keenly interested in agriculture, visited the Central School Fair yesterday and spoke favorably of the showing. Orillia is situated in Simcoe County, where mixed farming is carried on extensively. He reports that while both industry and agriculture have naturally been affected by world conditions during the past few years, there is now a strong feeling of optimism. Contrasting conditions in Canada with those prevailing in the United States, he sees abundant grounds for thankfulness. Orillia, Mr. Hale mentioned, had the first municipal electrical power system to be established in America. The power plant is situated on the Severn River, nineteen miles from the town. The low cost of electricity enables it to be used very extensively for domestic as well as power and lighting purposes. This has been a big factor in keeping down expenses. Mr. Hale paid a warm tribute to the work of the Women's Institutes in Ontario, and also the School Fair movement. He attends as many of the fairs and institute conventions as he can, and features prominently these activities, which he believes are of great importance in rural communities.
