—The farewell reception tendered by Rev. R. G. and Mrs. Strathie, held in the Presbyterian Church, Summerside last evening, was very largely attended, not only by the members of the congregation but by the public in general. Dr. Jardine acted as chairman, and after a few introductory remarks, called upon D. K. Currie, who on behalf of the congregation presented to Mr. and Mrs. Strathie an address accompanied by a purse of gold. Addresses were also presented from the different branches of the church as follows: Address to Mrs. Strathie from Ladies' Aid, read by Mrs. Bearisto, address from W. P. M. R., read by Mrs. C. W. Steeves and an address, accompanied by a purse of gold from the young men of the congregation, read by Graham Rogers. To all these addresses Mr. Strathie replied in a very feeling manner. After the addresses and presentations had been made short addresses were given by Rev. F. M. Webster, R. O. Moran, J. Strothard and E. J. Rattée, Malpeque, as well as by several other members of the congregation, a letter regretting his inability to be present was also read by the chairman from Rev. W. A. Mason, Tyne Valley. At the close of the reception the audience filed out through the church parlors, where each bid farewell to Mr. and Mrs. Strathie who leave for Charlottetown tomorrow.

Deceased who was eighty-two years of age was a native of Shediac and came to Summerside over forty years ago and for the past fifteen years has conducted a small grocery store at the west end of Water Street. He leaves to mourn besides a wife at present in Boston three sons, Maxim, Summerside, Phillip and Daniel in Bertou, also two daughters Mrs. James Ferguson and Mrs. Manchester, both of Boston. Deceased was an honorary member of the Summerside Labor Union, which society will attend his funeral in a body.

—An adjourned meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held in the council chamber, Summerside, last evening, the Mayor and all the Councillors, excepting Councillor Holman being present. Bills to the amount of \$481.20 were read, approved and ordered paid. The matter was referred back to the committee to try an arrangement before the close of the year. Some other matters of minor importance were discussed but nothing definite decided on after which council adjourned.

### WEALTHY WOMAN PRINCIPAL IN MURDER CASE

(Continued From Page One.)

not even known that it was loaded. The utter lack of a motive seems to be the weak point of the theory that Mrs. Dodge committed the deed with which she is charged. The defendant is by far the wealthiest and socially most prominent woman in this town. There has never been a breath of suspicion concerning her character, there seems to have been nothing in her previous career that even faintly suggested scandal or any entanglement. Mrs. Dodge was not only prominent in society, but also in church work and enjoyed an excellent reputation. On the other hand, Heath, the victim of the murder, was a hard working, sober and industrious workman, quiet and inoffensive, without the slightest suspicion against his moral character or his honesty. He was married and had several children. It is true, that Heath and Mrs. Dodge had some slight difference concerning the bill for some work which Heath had done upon a previous occasion for Mrs. Dodge, but the matter had been smoothed over and Mrs. Dodge had again engaged Heath to work for her.

At the coming trial Attorney General Sargent will be assisted by State's Attorney Hunt, while Harlan B. Howe, of St. Johnsbury and several other distinguished lawyers will be arrayed to defend Mrs. Dodge. An interesting legal battle is expected and it is believed that the State will be seriously handicapped by its inability to show a sufficiently adequate motive on the part of the defendant. Nothing definite is known concerning the line upon which Mrs. Dodge's lawyers will make their fight, but it is believed they will attempt to show that some stranger entered the house of Mrs. Dodge during the morning, without the knowledge of the owner and, that for some reason he shot Heath. It is expected that the defence will advance the theory that the stranger, who afterward killed Heath, may have entered the house with the intent to commit the robbery. In support of that theory it is pointed out that there was a small safe in the room in which Heath was at work at the time of his death and that it was the general belief in town that Mrs. Dodge kept money and valuables in that safe at different times. The outcome of the mysterious case is awaited with the greatest interest by lawyers and the public in general.
