Lecture At St. Dunstan's

The first of a series of lectures to be held under the auspices of the St. Thomas Literary and Debating Society, St. Dunstan's University was delivered to the students of that institution on Wednesday evening, Dec. 10th, by Hon. Judge Arsenault, who selected for his subject "The British Constitution as Related to Government." Mr. F. J. McMillan introduced the speaker, who held the close attention of his audience through out the course of his lecture. The subject was one in which His Honour was quite at home, and in a concise and clear manner he outlined the functions and powers of the different factors of the British Government, which he declared is the most democratic in the world. At the close of the lecture a hearty vote of thanks, moved by Mr. Alban Farmer and seconded by Mr. Geo. MacDonald was unanimously carried and tendered to the lecturer. Rev. D. P. Croken, in supporting the motion, emphasized the lesson of application to study as exemplified by His Honour, who unselfishly gave so much of his time for the benefit of the students. Dr. W. J. P. McMillan congratulated the students on the work of their debating society, which, he said, would be of great assistance in preparing the future of public life. A musical program, rendered by Messrs Campbell Martel and Raymond Martin was enjoyed by all. The singing of the National Anthem brought the proceedings to a close.

Major K. S. Rogers Speaks On Radio

At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the feature of the programme was the address by Major Keith S. Rogers on "The Latest in Radio."

Major Rogers stated that the just year has seen a great many developments in radio, not rather a steady progress in the spread of the radio service.

The outstanding developments have included the establishment of a Canadian National Railways Broadcasting Station at Moncton, N. B., which will ultimately prove of inestimable value to all inhabitants of the Maritime Provinces, the main advantage of this station being that at all times programmes can be received from it regardless of weather conditions in the Atlantic Provinces.

The design of receivers has seen little if any change, but the public as a whole have shown a greater willingness to take up radio as a serious adjunct to the home.

The high class of radio receivers, invented in many cases almost ten years ago are now finding a ready market. During the past three years these receivers were not manufactured in any quantity or were not advertised for sale to any extent, because the public were not sufficiently schooled in radio to invest as much in it as they would in a high grade phonograph.

This year radio will far outclass the phonograph in volume of sales, the strongest evidence of this being the fact that the great music houses of Canada and the United States, including some of the oldest and most reliable phonograph manufacturers, are today manufacturing and marketing radio sets. They have succumbed to the inevitable and realize that radio will eventually supplant the phonograph in almost every way of entertainment and a news and utility value which a phonograph could never fill.

As to interferences encountered locally in the city of Charlottetown these are not of a serious nature and can be remedied, and in fact are being remedied to a large extent every day. The more serious is the result of poor electric wiring throughout the city, largely in old buildings and occasionally faulty connections on the high tension power supply. Wherever a spark is caused by faulty connections of this sort sensitive radio receivers for a block or more around receive a buzzing or growing noise. This interference is gradually being eliminated by the energetic and sympathetic assistance of Mr. McKie, the Superintendent of the Maritime Light and Power in this city, who is one of the most ardent radio enthusiasts we have in Charlottetown. Jim and his line repair crew have done wonderful work towards eliminating this trouble. The next most serious interference is caused by the careless handling of the more expensive type of receivers commonly known as the regenerative type. This interference is manifested by

whistles, squeals and groans in all neighbouring receivers, and it can only be eliminated by careful instruction on the part of the salesman in selling these people types of machines and by the cooperation and good fellowship shown by their owners after these are installed.

We are glad to see that the great majority of owners in this city are anxious to keep their particular machine from spoiling their neighbour's programmes, and generally a few nights after a new set is installed, no further serious trouble is experienced by the neighbours.

Unfortunately the non-regenerative sensitive receivers, owing to their necessary high class construction are expensive in first cost, and it would be a hardship at the present time to bar the other type of receiver from sale, as it would shut out a great many people from any enjoyment of the wonderful radio programmes available every night.

In conclusion Major Rogers said that radio in its present state of development may be compared to the automobile. A man who needs an automobile today and would find any pleasure for his family in the ownership of one, would be looked upon as extremely foolish if he delayed the purchase for the simple reason that the automobile of one or two years hence will be somewhat improved over the machine you can purchase today.

Similarly the radio which he purchased this year would give him in three or four years.

Major Rogers also touched briefly on the programmes, and the necessity of all receiving sets corresponding regularly with the broadcasting stations, showing their importance and giving their much needed criticism so necessary in the preparation of future programmes.

In referring to the Moncton Station, he said that this station was for the benefit of the three Maritime Provinces and that the Tourist Association of this Province had been asked to prepare a speech to be broadcasted, setting forth the advantages of the Island as a tourist resort.

The speaker also made the suggestion that there should be a Prince Edward Island night at which musicians from this province could go over to Moncton and broadcast a program.

The meeting was presided over by Rotarian F. A. Bourke. Mr. Norman Watson was a guest.
