Increased Sanatorium Accommodation Urged By Canadian Legion

Members of the Canadian Legion throughout Prince Edward Island are very actively interested themselves in the movement for an increase in the Sanatorium accommodation for those afflicted with tuberculosis in this province. Practically all of the Legion branches, from Tignish in the west to Souris in the east, have already passed strongly worded resolutions urging that the Provincial Government at once take the necessary steps to meet the situation. In conversation yesterday with Capt. N. W. Lowther, the president of the Legion's Provincial Committee, he said that of course the desirability—the necessity—of adequately coping with the scourge of tuberculosis is particularly obvious to veterans and their families, and there is every fear that it is likely to become increasingly apparent to those engaged in the present struggle.

Already a considerable number of the beds in the Provincial Sanatorium are occupied by men of the services. With no empty beds in the institution now what is to be done with the others from this Province who will inevitably succumb to tuberculosis in the strenuous conditions which are certain to obtain here the great invasion of Europe begins.

Women's Institutes. In addition to the needs and interests of the service men, said Captain Lowther, the Legion has on past occasions been very greatly indebted to the members of the Women's Institutes, and realizes what an outstanding influence for good, in this province, this splendidly organized body of women has been. The present Sanatorium extension movement has been principally initiated by the Women's Institute, and the full membership of the Legion is going to back them up one hundred per cent.

The condition in this Province at present is such that at least one half of those suffering from the dread tuberculosis in its earlier stages (when adequate care and treatment would practically assure another) are to all intents and purposes denied hope because of lack of sanatorium beds, and in addition there is the fearful danger of infection or least some of those with whom they associate. This is an alarming and correctable condition, but should to high heaven and should be fully manifest to an educated and prospering community such as we have here.

Economically too it seems to be the height of folly to delay the provision of the needed sanatorium accommodation if the testimony of the doctors is accepted. The doctors claim that the death rate from tuberculosis in this Province could at the very least be cut in two if all victims could receive sanatorium treatment over a period of ten years. This would probably necessitate twice the present accommodation for a few years but after that ever less accommodation would probably be needed than we are keeping up now.

Indicative of the various resolutions respecting the situation being passed by the different Legion branches is this one which was unanimously carried at the last meeting of the Summerside branch: "Whereas the present provision in beds at the Prince Edward Island Sanatorium is adequate for less than 50 per cent of the active cases of tuberculosis in this Province; and whereas this inadequate provision and the consequent late treatment of cases result in the early death of otherwise curable patients, and endangers the lives of a great number of other people; therefore we, the members of the Legion, will tend to break down physical resistance to this dread disease, and will probably result in an increase of cases among the members of the armed forces on demobilization; and whereas the necessary steps should be taken at the present time to cope with such an exigency; therefore be it resolved that the Summerside Branch Canadian Legion request the Provincial Government to meet the situation by providing 200 beds for tuberculosis patients as recommended by the medical authorities of the Province."

Mr. Joseph A. Arsenault, well-known merchant at Borden, died yesterday after an illness of only three hours. He was about 63 years old. Mr. Arsenault lived formerly at Wellington, P. E. I. He moved to Borden and opened a store about five years ago. Surviving are his wife and two sons and three daughters. One son is a member of the crew of the ferry Prince Edward Island. Another son is a member of the firm of Arsenault and Gaudet at Wellington.

Funeral arrangements were not completed last night. It was thought possible that a daughter in the United States would come home and arrangements were held up awaiting word from her.

U. S. Still Considering. WASHINGTON, May 12—(AP)—Plans for work on farms and possibly on road construction jobs are still under consideration, officials said today. The government is still involved here but no arms have been sold. These officials estimated there are about 10,000 prisoners in the United States now. The number probably will be swelled considerably by Italian and German soldiers captured in Tunisia.

Powerful Blows Being Planned At Washington. WASHINGTON, May 12—(CP)—Powerful blows against the common enemy in Europe and Asia were being plotted here today by President Roosevelt in the inner recesses of the White House. The two allied leaders had a series of talks on global strategy last night and today. The arrival in Washington of the British Prime Minister, and at the same time, their military advisers were conferring together on technical aspects of the war in every section of the world.

The two master strategists of the United Nations, enthusiastic over the allied cleanup in Tunisia, are believed to be concerned with three primary problems. 1. Plans for the reopening of the Burma Road to ease the terrific strain on China and as a means of supplying the armies of Chung Kai-Shek with the arms and munitions they require so urgently. 2. Relations of the Soviet Union with the other United Nations and means of strengthening Russia to combat Hitler's expected go-or-die offensive this summer. 3. A last-minute examination of the status of the invasion of Europe, plans that have been in process of completion for months but only now are due to be put into operation, following the allied cleanup in Tunisia and Italian forces in North Africa.

A clear indication that Japan will be the subject of part of the discussion is the announcement that Mr. Churchill was accompanied by Washington by Britain's three top military leaders in India. Field Marshal Sir Archibald P. Wavell, commander-in-chief in India, Admiral Sir James Somerville, commander-in-chief of the eastern fleet based at Ceylon, and Air Chief Marshal Sir Richard Peirse, Air Officer commanding in India.

Here to greet them were Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell, commander of American troops in India and China, and Maj. Gen. Claire Chennault, commanding American air forces in China. These are the two
