It should be stressed, however, that if we succeed in maintaining a high level of employment and income, our domestic market, for beef as for other products, will be much larger than before the war. Because of increased purchasing power, civilian per capita consumption of dairy products excluding butter, of meat and of eggs increased during the war by something like 30 per cent, and that of fresh fruits and vegetables by around 40 per cent, while consumption of grain products decreased by around 5 per cent. The growth in fluid milk consumption over the war years was extraordinary

Former Premier Of Alberta Dies

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—Hon. Charles Stewart 78, former Liberal Premier of Alberta and Canadian chairman of the International Joint Commission, died at his home here today. Burial will be made at Beechwood Cemetery here Monday.

Ill for the last few months, Mr. Stewart had served on the Commission since January, 1936. His lengthy experience in Canadian public affairs and in the field of international relations made him a distinguished figure in Ottawa.

Born at Strabane, Ont., in 1868, he went to Alberta at an early age. He was first elected to the Alberta Legislature in 1909 representing the constituency of Killam. In 1912 he was appointed provincial minister of municipal affairs, and after holding the post of works minister he succeeded the late A. L. Sifton as Premier.

Mr. Stewart resigned his office in 1921 and came to Ottawa as Federal Minister of the Interior and Mines. He took his seat in the commons at the by-election in Argenteuil, Que., in March, 1922. In the general election of 1925, he ran for the federal constituency of Edmonton West.

A forceful speaker, Mr. Stewart was a bulwark of strength to the Liberal Government's front benchers in the 1920's. Resigning his portfolio in 1930, he was re-elected in the same year. In 1935, he was defeated in the constituency of Jasper-Edson by the Social Credit candidate and shortly afterwards was appointed to the International Joint Commission.

ATLANTIC WHOLESALERS IN CONFERENCE

SACKVILLE N. E., Dec. 4.—An all-day meeting of the directors of Atlantic Wholesalers, Limited, was held in the offices of the company last Monday Mr. J. L. Dixon, president and general manager, was in the chair, and other directors present were the following:—K. R. Schofield, Montreal; M. G. Teed, St. John's; G. L. Avarad Moncton; Walter I. Dixon, E. A. The auditors' report for the nine months ending October 31st indicated continued expansion and development, with satisfactory earnings. Much routine business was transacted. A notable feature was the report of the early opening of the Saint John ware house—covering an acre of ground—which has been under construction for nearly a year. This wholesale grocery warehouse is the largest and most modern in the Maritime Provinces.

Reference was made to the acquisition of Digby Wholesalers Limited, of Digby, Nova Scotia, and to the Pension Plan which has been established for employees of the company. It was decided to erect a building on the corner of Main and Charlotte Streets, Sackville, to provide accommodation for the head office of the company. Plans have been prepared and work on the proposed head office building will likely begin in the spring of 1947.

Volunteer Service Medal Takes Precedence

OTTAWA, Dec. 6 — (CP) — A new echo of the zombie question emerged today when it was learned that Canadian veterans of the Second Great War, if and when they wear their ribbons, will place the Canadian Voluntary Service Medal ahead of the War Medal.

As an Empire decoration, the War Medal originally was considered to have precedence over the purely Canadian C.V.S.M. But the trouble started when volunteer veterans realized that drafted troops with as much as 28 days service would be entitled to wear the former.

Now, at Canadian request, it is understood the King has approved a reversal of priorities.

Scathing Cartoon On Lewis Tactics

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 — (CP) —Probably the onest and most censured man in the world today was John L. Lewis, pugnaclous, bushy-browed leader of the United Mine Workers who is generally blamed for putting out the Christmas lights of the United States by permitting his soft coal miners to leave the pits.

Most cutting personal attack, however, was put on Lewis in a cartoon occupying a full page in today's Times-Herald.

Holly-bordered and decorated, the picture showed a poor, snow-covered village street empty but for three horror-stricken children, the figure of Santa Claus prostrate with a pickaxe labelled "coal strike" driven into his back, and an empty sleigh with one of the eight reindeer looking back in wonder at the stricken figure of the Christmas saint.

The lettering was "Season's Greetings — John L. Lewis."

The Experts Say

OTTAWA, Dec. 3 — (CP) — Breakfast in haste and dine at leisure is the mode of life in Canada these days as many families tend to settle for a toast-and-coffee morning snack rather than take time to consume a more nourishing meal.

Home economists of the Consumer Section, Dominion Department of Agriculture, suggest the following supper meal should include dishes made from the whole cereals, such as cracked wheat or oatmeal, which the family misused at breakfast.

Oat Cheese Croquettes is one good supper dish which has rolled oats as a base.

The recipe: one and one-third cups rolled oats; one and two-thirds cups boiling water; three-quarters teaspoon salt; half cup grated cheese; one teaspoon chopped parsley; one teaspoon grated onion; few grains pepper; two chopped hard-cooked eggs; one-third cup dry bread crumbs or oatmeal.

Gradually stir rolled oats into boiling salted water stirring constantly for five minutes. Add cheese and stir until melted. Remove from heat and beat thoroughly until smooth. Add chopped parsley, onion, pepper and eggs. Chill mixture one hour. Shape into flat patties, roll in dry bread crumbs or oatmeal and pan-fry until nicely browned on both sides. Serve hot with sauce or relish. Six servings.

Health experts say in Canada about one-third of the energy supply of the diet comes from cereal products. The wheat berry supplies starch, germ, aleurone cells and bran.

The latter three are rich in iron and B vitamins, which aid digestion, appetite, steady the nerves, and assist in the proper use of energy foods by the body. Whole grain cereals, such as oatmeal, rolled oats and rolled wheat, retain a

large percentage of these nutrients. Consequently they should be used more frequently than refined products such as ordinary white flour, macaroni and polished rice. Canadian meals generally have been found low in the B vitamins.

Cereal cookies are another method of tricking the younger members into getting that necessary nourishment. Junior just won't be able to keep his hands away from the cookie-jar if mother has it filled with Cocoa Oatmeal Cookies. The recipe: one and one-half cups sifted pastry flour; one-half

teaspoon baking powder; one-half teaspoon salt; six tablespoons cocoa; one and one-quarter cups granulated sugar; one egg; one-half cup milk; one and one-half teaspoons vanilla; two-thirds cup shortening (or equivalent); two cups rolled oats. Sift first five ingredients into a bowl; beat egg well, then add milk. Drop by teaspoons on a greased cookie sheet. Bake in a moderate oven.
