THE deposits in the Government Savings Bank in Charlottetown during February were \$22,352 and the withdrawals \$21,172.65, leaving the balance on deposit \$1,784,049.67.

THE [Montreal Gazette says] that Sir William C. McDonald's latest gift of \$200,000 to McGill University will be devoted "entirely to enlarging the teaching staff and equipment of the McDonald mining and chemistry building. The importance of these departments, in view of the rapid development of the mineral resources of the Dominion, already taking place, and the greater prospective development is fully recognized by the University authorities. Magnificent though the present equipment of this department is, the continual advance and elaboration of machinery and methods in mining and mineralogy, make it be contemplated enlargements necessary in order to keep McGill thoroughly up-to-date, and make it, as is the governors' ambition, the finest school of mining and chemistry on this continent. It is understood that Sir William's gift includes the purchase for the mining department of what is probably the most complete mineralogical collection extant.

St. John has had a number of lectures on the South African war during recent months, the lecturers being of both sexes.

ACCORDING to the Montreal Star Private Reginald Cox of Prince Edward Island is among the wounded and was sent to England on March 6th.

close down about the 1st April. The closing down of these mills will be a loss to Dartmouth, as the mills shutting down have been employing considerable labor. Gunn & Co. and Cunningham & Curran will control the business supplying the others with meal at a reduced rate if desired. Greater supply than demand is the reason given for this new deal.

THE new council of Moncton is economizing in salaries. One \$900 a year employe of the water and light department has been allowed to go, and two policemen, Belyea and Milner, have been notified that their services will not be required after April 30th. It is the intention to get along with one less policeman in future and to appoint a new man in the place of Officer Belyea for Scott Act work. Some other changes will be made.

THE soldiers of the new Canadian garrison at Halifax have decided objection to the orders issued defining the bounds within which they are to be restricted in their going about the city. The railway station, all the wharves, and Upper Water Street, are declared to be out of bounds. They complain that all chances to row and to fish are denied them, and say they have never before been in a corps where they had been restricted as to what houses they could enter or what streets they could frequent.

It is now estimated that on the 1st of May when the cheese season for 1899-00 closes, our total exports will amount to \$18,000,000, the largest in the history of this trade. Many factories will begin making this month, and we may look for a big make of early fodder cheese. The market on the whole is slightly easier and lower than a week ago, the Liverpool cable being 6d. lower on both white and colored. Some few boxes of old stock were sold at Montreal during the week at 12 to 12½c., a half-cent lower than a week ago. A few factories east have contracted April cheese at 11c., but some are asking more money. Several lots of fodder cheese have been sold to the local trade at Montreal at 12½ to 13c.—Farming

The Pulley Belt.

The pulley belt, be it briefly explained, consists of two rings, attached one at each end of a belt; also attached to the belt ends are two short ribbons, and the belt fastens by passing the ribbons through the rings and then tying them in a bow. The pulley ring device is applied equally to leather or silk bands. The leather belts are widest in the center of the back and taper in front to a width adapted to the size of the ring. The plain silk belts have stiff stitched pads inserted to maintain the proper width at the back, and the ends are gathered into the rings. In buying these belts women take two inches less than their usual waist size, as this is about the proper distance apart for the rings when the belt is in use.
