MONDAY

GULF FULL OF ICE—Pilot Jones, who on Saturday flew the twin motor Canadian Airways plane to the Magdalen Islands, reports that the Gulf of St. Lawrence is full of drift ice. When he was down two weeks ago there was no ice to be seen except for a little along the north shore of the Prince and a little close inshore at the Magdalen. The trip Saturday was to clean up the mail that had accumulated here. On the return flight Mrs. Veneau from Amherst Island was a passenger. Another trip will be made on Tuesday or Wednesday this week if weather conditions permit. The monoplane with Pilot Fowler at the controls, was used on the Moncton run Saturday. The planes land on the Hillsboro River ice near the butte with mails and passengers as the road to Upton Airport is blocked for motor traffic.

Another link with the past was severed in the passing at the Charlotte Residence at an early hour Saturday morning of Miss Ada DeBlouis, last surviving member of the large family of the late Honourable George Wastie DeBlouis, grandfather of our present Lieutenant Governor.

Her charmingly bright and vivacious manner had endeared her to a particularly wide circle of relatives and friends, and throughout her long life she had been active in good works, and a constant and staunch supporter of St. Paul's Church. Among her many nieces who will survive are: Lieutenant Governor DeBlouis, Mr. Noel DeBlouis, Colonel Arthur G. Peake, Mr. E. deB. Peake, Mrs. Robert Colton of this city, Mrs. Edw. Aitken and Mr. Weston Peake of Montreal, Miss Audrey DeBlouis in Kangra, India, Mr. Lionel Peake, Vancouver, Mrs. S. B. G. Wright, Toronto, and Mrs. Stanley Hall, Winnipeg.

An esteemed citizen of Charlottetown passed away Thursday morning in the person of Mr. Murdoch G. Anderson, age 82. He was a man of splendid character, honorable and upright, and always endeavored to keep true to the fine traditions of his Scottish ancestors. He was a valued member of the United Church of this city.

The late Mr. Anderson was born at Newton, Belfast, and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Anderson.

His father had been engaged in farming and milling for many years and on his death in 1873 two of his sons, Murdoch and Alexander, took over the property, combining farming with milling. In 1898 they dissolved partnership. Alexander took over part of the land at Charlottetown, where he has been residing since his death in 1918. He was married, first to Miss Margaret Murchison of Point Prim, then to Miss Anne MacMillan of Wood Islands. His third wife, who survives him, was Miss Christina Bell, widow of the late John Balderson, at one time school inspector for Queen's County. She at present is a patient in the Prince Edward Island Hospital, having severely injured her hip as the result of a fall not long before her husband's death.

Curfew law in Charlottetown would be more effective than the prohibition law if the law was the opinion of Major T. McNutt, secretary of the local School Board, when the question of calling children from the streets at nine o'clock every evening was discussed at a meeting of the Board of Management of the Children's Aid Society of Charlottetown.

The Society's Board has been looking into the question of curfew for Charlottetown and at the meeting a report from the Summerside town officer declared curfew in the town had brought satisfactory results.

Major McNutt said he feared such a law would not be approved by many and it tended to more class legislation.

Rev. Father E. Dalton, Vice President of the Society, was in the chair. Reports from Mr. W. J. Bradburn, special agent of the Children's Aid, were also heard by the meeting.

Mr. Percy W. Turner, a candidate Mayor of Charlottetown by a majority of 229 votes in the civic election yesterday. The contest drew 1,629 voters to the polls.

Ward Five's three City Council representatives for the next two year term will be Messrs. Ernest A. Connor and G. D. Wright—received acclamations on nomination day.

Mayor-elect Turner, who is also district governor of the International Rotary Club for the Maritimes and Newfoundland, led in the vote for the majority in all but one of the 12 polls. He received 929 votes against 700 accorded his opponent, Mr. B. R. Holman, retiring chairman of the city finance committee and a councillor for the past eight years.

Dr. F. Charles Dougan won in Ward Two over John Macdonald in a contest for the seat left vacant by the retirement of Councillor M. W. Reardon. Dr. Dougan received 118 votes while Mr. Macdonald received 75.

Dr. Heath MacIntyre polled the largest vote—265—in Ward Four. He had a majority of 86 over the defeated Councillor Robert Rattray.

Mr. E. C. Chandler, former president of the Provincial Canadian Legion division, was elected to the other Council seat in the Ward with a vote of 242 and a majority of 63.

Councillors J. E. Blanchard and Mr. Arthur A. MacDougall and Mr. Vincent Blake were defeated in Ward Five.

The largest vote in the Ward was accorded Mr. Ernest A. Foster, with Mr. George W. McLeod only one ballot behind. Mr. Foster received 364 votes and a majority of 17, while Mr. McLeod had 363 votes and a majority of 16.

Mr. Henry Laphorn had 355 ballots in his favor—a margin of eight over defeated Councillor Blanchard who drew 347 votes

FURTHER INFORMATION—The first trip of the airplane from Magdalen Islands on January 9th was notable by reason of the departure of Mr. John H. McLean, popularly known as "Papay" of Entry Island for the Charlottetown Hospital. Entry Island is composed of about 60 families, of whom Old John, as he is called, is the principal citizen. He has raised 15 children. He is the father of Mr. Daniel K. McLean, lighthouse keeper of that place. Three of his boys joined the navy during the Great War. This venerable old man was seriously ill, and this led the members of his family to seek the services of an airplane to transport him to a hospital where he could receive expert care and nursing. As a result, that daring aviator, Jones, of the Canadian Airways, Charlottetown, hurried over from Prince Edward Island to take Mr. McLean to the hospital. Pilot Jones succeeded in landing in a field within a short distance from the lighthouse, and taxied almost to Old John's very door-step.

After a few days illness Mrs. Sarah Glover MacLeod, widow of the late Norman N. MacLeod, passed away at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. E. G. Saunders, 56 Orlebar Street, Charlottetown on Tuesday.

Mrs. MacLeod, who was born in Murray Harbour 86 years ago, was the daughter of Thomas Glover, a native of Dumfrireshire, Scotland and his wife, Sarah Hugh, who was of United Empire Loyalist stock. Mr. and Mrs. MacLeod resided for a number of years at Vernon River and then removed, thirty years ago to St. Avard's in the suburbs of Charlottetown, where Mr. MacLeod died twenty-two years ago.

Mrs. MacLeod possessed many fine qualities of mind and heart, and was always bright and cheerful. She was very fond of reading and retained her mental alertness and interest in affairs of the day until the very last.

She was a member of Trinity United Church. She was the last surviving member of a family of twelve. She leaves to mourn two daughters, Mrs. E. G. Saunders, with whom she had been living for a number of years past, and Miss E. MacLeod.

She will be laid to rest this afternoon in the People's Cemetery, the service starting at 2 o'clock and the funeral leaving at 2:30
