HOCKEY CLUBS ARE WARNED BY M. A. H. A.

Compliance with Rules To Be Enforced—Promotion of Junior Hockey Is Advised.

Mr. H. O. Schryer, President, M. A. H. A., writes: With May 15th approaching, press despatches of late throughout the Maritimes show a decided increase in change of residence of hockey stars. This is the final date allowed by the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association for players intending to play in a new town next season, but it would be well for all hockey players contemplating a change of residence at this conspicuous time of the year, to make sure that the conditions surrounding such a move, comply with the C. A. H. A. regulations, should they hope to play hockey for their new city or town next year.

All clubs who are being raided by other clubs must be satisfied that the change of residence of the players they are losing, complies with all regulations before they issue the release of said players. These regulations referred to state that applications for transfer shall contain a sworn declaration that the transfer is made at the personal request of the player; that no monetary or other consideration has been given or will be received in connection with the transfer; that no position or situation, salary or bonus, gift, loan or inducement has been offered or will be accepted for his services as a player. An officer of any Club found guilty by his Branch of knowingly signing or taking a false affidavit to procure transfer of playing certificates for any player shall be automatically prohibited for life from holding any office in a club, league, union or association under the jurisdiction of the C. A. H. A. Any Amateur Hockey Club deemed guilty by the Executive of this Association of offering monetary or other considerations as set forth above or of conniving in such action through any of its officers, shall be expelled from the Branch with which it is allied and any club playing a player

enticed to the club by any such action shall be suspended.

CURB THE TOURIST

An endeavor is being made this year by all branches of the C. A. H. A. to curb the activities of the "Tourist" hockey player and in order to protect the Maritimes from a repetition of what happened to the Truro Club last season, when three of their stars were barred from Allan Cup competition. This warning is going out to the clubs at this time so that there will be no grief next winter.

Players who have come or who are contemplating coming into the Maritimes before May 15 to play hockey next season must obtain a release from their old club and make sure that their transfer will be granted them by the Registrar of the C. A. H. A. Branch they are leaving, before making the move.

DEVELOP JUNIORS

These regulations are tightening up on instructions from the President of the C. A. H. A. and it would appear that the only alternative that the Maritimes should adopt, is the promotion of Junior hockey in all towns where Senior hockey is being played and within a year or two there will be a steady source of hockey material available right here in the Maritimes without having to depend on importing players from other Provinces in the Dominion.

FOR MEMORIAL CUP

At the annual meeting of the C. A. H. A. held in Winnipeg last month, the Maritime delegates were successful in obtaining a \$500 grant for the promotion of Junior hockey and next season with all towns properly organized and Junior leagues formed, the Maritime Junior champions will meet the Quebec champions in the Memorial Cup playdowns and if successful will go further in the Dominion Junior playdowns with all expenses paid by the C. A. H. A.

The regulations covering Junior hockey are the same as Senior with the exception that a Junior player is one who is under twenty years of age on January 1 of the season in which he wishes to play and his Club shall furnish the Branch Registrar with official proof of his age.
