THE NEW YORK ELECTION.

The interest for both Canadians and citizens of the Republic in the fall elections in the United States centred very largely in the contest for the governorship of New York. This arose from various causes, among which are the wealth and population of the Empire State, with its six millions of people and enormous industrial and commercial interests. Then there was the fact of the opposing parties being marshalled and directed by the notorious "Bosses", Croker and Platt. And there was the well-known fact that the City of Greater New York was tolerably certain to give a Democratic majority while in the state outside the Republican preponderance was equally reassured.

Boss rule has fallen considerably into disrepute, but the reign of the great party directors is by no means over, more's the pity. Both the candidates were reputable men, better and cleaner by far than the bosses under whose guidance they found it necessary to place themselves in order to obtain the full benefit of the party machinery by which elections are managed. Col. Roosevelt had in addition a good record as an administrator in various public positions he had held, and most of all had to his credit his achievements in the late war. No great fame of an enduring sort is likely to be accorded in history to any of the military commanders at the head of the operations on hand in Cuba. The naval commanders gained the really brilliant victories of the struggle. But Col. Roosevelt was so fortunate as to gain some distinction in the field at the head of his Rough Riders and was equally fortunate in escaping the plentiful censure awarded in other quarters and to other officers of high rank.

The Republican party clearly traded on Col Roosevelt's war record to evade state issues and escape a too close examination of the party's corrupt management while in control of the state. On the other side Tammany's past misdeeds were doubtless as bad or worse. It seems to have been hoped by the more independent voters, who are opposed to machine rule, that Roosevelt would be more likely to take his own way, and if needs to be set Platt at defiance than Van Wyck would be to show any independence of Croker. In fact it seems not unlikely at this distance that the most prudent choice has been made between the two men. Doubtless in the flush of enthusiasm over the nation's victories on land and sea, Roosevelt's war record was a powerful factor toward his success.

These are big figures in circulation for Canadian journals and speak volumes for the enterprise and popularity of the leading newspaper of Montreal.

Le Soliel of Quebec, is angry with the temperance people for desiring the enactment of a prohibitory law. It affirms that the reason why the six English-speaking provinces desire prohibition is because they are so much more drunken than Quebec that they despair of keeping their people sober except by cutting off the supply of intoxicants.
