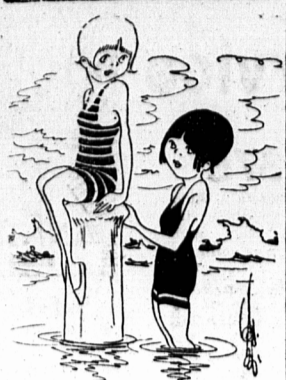

His place of business was a centre for tourists and he served the P. E. I. Tourist Association well as their headquarters in Summerside for information. He was also Vice-President of the P. E. I. Motor League and one of the most valuable members of this organization. His death at the age of 63 years is a distinct loss to Summerside and the Island generally. There are left to mourn besides a sorrowing widow, two brothers, Councillor John Grady, Summerside, and Mr. T. B. Grady, Supt. of the Island Division of the C. N. R. The Guardian joins with the whole community in extending sincere sympathy to the bereaved. The funeral takes place tomorrow (Wednesday) afternoon at 2 o'clock.
