changes will have to be made, for example:—

- (1) Installation of adequate modern bath- and toilet-rooms. (2) Installation of a proper kitchen, dining-rooms and store-rooms with mechanical refrigeration. (3) Rearrangement to provide sick wards, examining-rooms, etc.

STAFF

17. The appointment, as Medical Superintendent, of a qualified psychiatrist with institutional experience.

18. That an assistant superintendent be appointed.

19. That one or two medical internes be appointed.

20. That appointments be made of consultants to the Hospital staff.

21. That there be appointed one public health nurse, adequately trained in mental hygiene, who would, under the direction of the Medical Superintendent, supervise the home care of patients discharged from Hospital on trial.

22. That nurses be in charge of all wards, male as well as female.

23. That nursing care be provided for physically ill male patients.

24. That attendants be used as supervisors only, working under the direction of a nurse in charge of the wards.

25. That organized instruction for the attendants be provided, and that their promotion depend upon their ability to profit by their instruction.

26. That Section XIII and XIV of the Act be fully enforced, with modifications (recommendations 2 and 3, sections XI—page 21—of this report).

RECREATION. 41. That the question of recreation be the responsibility of the auxiliary committee which is recommended. That this committee be requested to arrange for frequent entertainments, for a library, for radios on the wards, etc.

RECORDS. 42. That adequate records be kept of the physical and mental condition of all cases, including the findings of all examinations, progress notes, record of treatment, etc.

TREATMENT. 31. That an adequate qualified staff be appointed.

OCCUPATION. 38. That plans be made to provide occupation for all patients who are capable of occupation.
