THE BULL—EXERCISE AND FEED. A bull must of necessity be kept confined most of the time. For this reason his quarters should be kept clean, airy, well lighted and comfortable. And this not from humane reasons only but because it will pay to do so.

Many farmers sacrifice valuable aged bulls and substitute young and immature animals because they have not the accommodation for the former or are afraid to handle them. For this reason much good blood has been wasted to the detriment of the dairy herd or beef herd as it may be. From calfhood the bull should be well cared for, well fed and trained. Good care and training will do much to combat any tendency to become cross and unruly. In fact if a bull is petted from time to time as he grows up, except in rare instances, there is no danger of his ever becoming vicious. When about one year old a ring should be put in his nose and when the wind has headed he may be handled with halter and staff. It is always safer to watch out for trouble and never to allow oneself to get into a tight place. A bull often shows marked intelligence at times and seems to know well when he has an advantage.

### Interesting Letter From Island Soldier

The following letter was received by Capt. J. N. McDonald, Inspector of Dredges from his brother Hugh S. McDonald one of the famous 7th Battalion First Canadian Expeditionary force. This man has been at the front since Feb., 1915 and was continuously in the trenches with the exception of about three months. He with a number of Canadians, worked in the woods with the Royal Engineers, preparing for the great drive of July last. He was through most of the great battles, and had many hair-breadth escapes but so far has miraculously escaped even a scratch. France, Sept. 29th, 1916.

My Dear Brother: I am going to write you a few lines tonight in answer to your letter received a short time ago. I was glad to hear that you are all well at home, and that mother is in her usual health. I am well myself and never had a scratch yet. Thank God, Well John.

Things are moving pretty well around here this spell back. I did not get a chance to write you as soon as I would like to. The Canadians are kept pretty busy lately and are doing wonderful work. I don't think they can be beaten in the whole front and the Hunns have a particular spite at them, but they always get more than they bargain for when they attack us.

Of course there are quite a few a few casualties, but not at all to be compared to what the Germans get. I tell you they get a fearful pounding. I don't see for the life of me how they stand it at all. You should see the havoc our big shells make of their trenches. Their artillery cannot now be compared to the British guns, and they are twice beaten in the air. You would give anything to see a fight in the air. You would compare their big machines to a big crowd attacked by half a dozen sparrows. I tell you they cannot stay long over our trenches. Sometimes they come early in the morning before it is daylight. And invariably they come on a cloudy day, above the clouds. Then talk about thunder and lightning I tell you it is interesting.

We have taken a large number of prisoners lately, some of them are tough looking I tell you, old men that you would hardly ask to do farm work let alone fight, and a lot of very young boys. But we have captured some fine looking specimens of manhood too. It looks as if they were filling up the wastage with anything they can get. The weather has been ideal here lately but I suppose we are in for a spell of wet weather pretty soon now. It makes everything miserable for a few months in this muddy soil it will be the next thing to impos-

### Vain Boast Of Cowardly Hunns

(Canadian Press Despatch.) AMSTERDAM, Oct. 20.—(Via London).—The Volks Zeitung of Cologne says: "German submarines will operate in the future in the western Atlantic. They will visit the well known shipping routes around the eastern point of Nantucket Island and will sink British merchantmen after giving the crews opportunity to save themselves."

### RUSSIANS CAPTURE HORSES AND ARMS.

(Special to the Guardian.) PETROGRAD, Oct. 20.—Successes for Russian troops in Persia are announced in today's War Office announcement as follows: ON THE CAUCASUS FRONT IN PERSIA our patrols conducted gallant reconnoitering operations on the Bid Var in Damer neighborhood near Damber Pass; they successfully attacked a long transport caravan and captured a large number of horses and arms.

### ITALY PRODUCES SPEEDIEST OF WAR VESSELS.

ROME, via, Paris, Oct. 20.—Italy now possesses a type of warship whose speed is three times as great as that of the greatest trans-Atlantic liner, according to the Giornale Italia. The sea trial of the first of these ships was witnessed by a correspondent of the paper. Three others are building. All will use oil fuel.

### SET ADRIAT BY HUN PIRATES, FOUR PERISH.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Crews of certain Norwegian vessels, torpedoed by German submarines, were placed in small boats and endured dreadful sufferings before reaching land, says a Bergen despatch to the Copenhagen Politiken, transmitted by the Exchange Telegraph Company. Some men were frozen to death, the report adds, and a Norwegian mate died on his arrival at Alexandrudd, near Archangel.

### Germans Assume Offensive in Roumania

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PETROGRAD, Oct. 20.—Von Mackenro's German army has assumed the offensive in eastern Roumania, according to an announcement by the war office this afternoon. The Germans and Bulgarians have suffered great losses. The battle continues. The official statement follows: "In Dobruja at 7 o'clock the enemy opened fire and assumed the offensive. The onsets were repulsed with great loss to him. In the Black Sea a Russian submarine sank two Turkish steamers."

Following is the extract from a letter received by Mr. Romanus McDonald, Glenfannan, from his brother James S.: Sarcee Camp 218th Battalion, "B", Canada.

October 11th, 1916. Dear Brother—I guess you have given up hope of hearing from me again. I must be about two months since I got your last letter. Well I intended to write sooner but did not have much time to think of writing as I was out on the harvest field for six weeks and only got to camp about a week ago. I got a letter from father the other day in which he made the remark that there was a report that I was promoted to Sergeant, that doesn't happen to be true as I sacrificed my chances for promotion for the present by going out harvesting, instead of going to the Musketry School. But don't be disappointed as you have a brother holding that rank, for Jack got his three stripes during my absence. Well I haven't time to think of anything to say tonight so I guess I will have to close, hoping this will reach you all in the best of health a blessing we both enjoy here in Sarcee. We expect to be going up to Edmonton soon and I don't think we will be going overseas before Christmas.
