ROYALS WIN FIRST GAME OF JUNIOR FINALS

Larkins Stars In Nets But Crystals Lose To Williams Coached Clan 3-2

Charlotte's Junior Royals last night defeated the Junior Crystals three goals to two in the first game of the finals for the Prince Edward Island junior hockey title. The Charlottetown team will carry their slim lead into the second game at Charlottetown Friday night, but should prove sufficient. In the first two periods last night Royals had enough scoring chances to win a dozen games, but young Dave Larkins in the Crystal cage performed sensationally as he blocked with stick, legs or arms drives that appeared to have goals labelled all over them in the two periods he allowed but two pucks to elude him and it was this heavily padded figure that alone kept the score from mounting.

During the last ten minutes of the third period, after the Royals had added their third goal in the first three minutes, the winners appeared satisfied with their lead and made little or no attempt to score. They were content with holding their opponents at bay. The first two periods, however, produced plenty of action. Royals scored one goal in each session, holding Summerside to a single goal while in the final period each team counted once.

Opens Scoring
Five minutes from the start of the first period Royals went into the lead. After the first line had been held scoreless, McCintick, Blanchard and Carmody made their presence felt on the very first attack. Breaking at centre Blanchard swept in fast and his accurate pass to McCintick saw the right winger go in close and backhand the water into the cage. Royals, seeking goals pressed for the balance of the session but the spectacular Larkins held them out.

Evans Count
After seven minutes of even battling in the second session Summerside evened it up as Muttart hoisted one from outside the line that the Royal goalie misjudged and the rubber rustled the cords. It took the winners over six minutes to get to the counter back and it was Eddie Darrach who turned the trick. Stopping a Summerside assault the fast skating defence-man stickchecked his way through the entire Crystal team and Larkins was beaten on a waist high drive from outside the crease. For the remainder of the period Royals pressed savagely but again the brilliant Summerside goalie turned their attempts aside. In the two periods Larkins had made eighteen saves to the Royals' goalies two.

The third period proved dull and uninteresting. Three minutes from the start, Wilf Whalen pulled off another spectacular solo effort to send the Royals into a 3-1 lead, the right winger splitting the defence to pull Larkins out and ease the water into the empty net. It was the last Royal goal of the game. They set the losers attempts back regularly and only once did they slip up. At the 15 minutes mark LeBlanc took Hogan's pass to bring the score to 3-2, but despite their stout efforts they could not get the equalizer.
