A Hampton correspondent writes:—La grippe has been "going the rounds" this winter and the general question is "have you had the grippe?"—A number of the young people of Hampton and Victoria assembled at the home of Ewen and Mrs. McKinnon on the 28th ult. to celebrate the 15th birthday of their daughter, Miss Hannah, and the 11th birthday of their son Wilbur. After tea the young people repaired to the drawing-room where many interesting games were played. Music, both vocal and instrumental, was furnished by Miss Hannah McKinnon, Miss Minnie Inman, Neavy Myers and Miss Idella McKinnon. After a very pleasant time refreshments were served and then the party broke up. The presents were numerous.—Among visitors at Hampton are Mrs. W. Stewart and Miss Freda from Victoria who are visiting at J. T. Inman's.

Militiamen readers of The Guardian will be interested in the following extract from a report of the proceedings in the Dominion Parliament a few days ago. Replying to a question concerning the militia parade at Quebec, Sir Frederick said: "The militia is a very important strength of each company except those in the far west. The gathering would be regular camp of instruction with a great parade at the end. There would be no recruits, only those who had drilled before would be included. All the officers will go. The cost would be charged to the militia expenditure not to the Quebec battlefields vote. It was intended to make a representation of western corps, but not up to fifty per cent. Those members of the city corps who do not go to Quebec will have their drill at home. Those of the rural corps who were not taken to Quebec would get no drill."

The recent debate between the students of Kings and Mt. Allison College was quite an event. Mount Allison was victorious over Kings both in form and argument. Kings argued in favor of the secession of the Maritime Provinces from the Dominion. Hon. Barker, Hon. White Prof. McDonald, judges, made the award as follows: Kings, argument 588, form 265, total 853; Mount Allison, argument 614, form 296, total 910. Mount Allison was represented by J. C. Rand, Moncton; A. R. Reynolds, Newport, N. S.; J. S. Astbury, Stellarton, N. S. Kings men were L. H. Martell, J. F. Tupper, G. E. Tobin, the last being from St. John. The debate was held in Lingley Hall, Sackville, N. B., and was well attended. Prof. Tweedie acted as chairman. Reynolds claimed secession would be against expansion and showed how the provinces have progressed under confederation. Great coal, iron and steel interests of the provinces are bound up with the Dominion and secession would be to get uncertainty for a certainty. It would moreover, remove Upper Canadian markets for the provinces. He also instanced some of the advantages the provinces have under present conditions. Tobin, who followed, held that confederation had increased the liabilities of the provinces, and had taken away their on-marching position. He touched also upon the matter of the P. E. I. tunnel, and pointed out the impossibility of P. E. I. ever improving the means of communication when separated entirely. He emphasized also the importance of the piece of the provinces in the Empire's leading colony, which they would lose if other points were dealt with, after which Rand and Martell followed in rebuttal. After the debate the Kings team was entertained by the Eurietorian Society of Mount Allison at supper in the Sackville restaurant.

The St. John Star, in speaking of this Province and automobiles says: "The legislature of Prince Edward Island has declared in favor of the total exclusion of automobiles from that province, and a bill giving effect to this resolution will be introduced and passed at the present session, both parties being in agreement on the principle. This is a rather peculiar step to be taken by any province in an age such as this, but in Prince Edward Island conditions are peculiar. The country is thickly settled and although railways reach most of the principal towns there are many districts from which residents can go to the cities only by carriages, as trade centres chiefly in the capital and two or three smaller towns in other countries and is not distributed through the province as much as is the case in New Brunswick, hundreds of farmers find it necessary to drive from place to place every week. The distances are not great and horses are perhaps used more than in any other province of the Dominion. On the island at present there are only nine automobiles. Since the first one was imported there have been a large number of accidents arising from the somewhat terrifying appearance of these machines. It is very doubtful if the legislature has power to pass such a law as this, and there is still greater doubt that even if such power is possessed the act will remain in force for many years. It can scarcely be regarded as advanced legislation, but it is perhaps in line with that other famous bill by which commercial travellers were subjected to an annual tax of \$100 which brought to the province a few thousand dollars in direct revenue, but for which the people paid many times this amount in higher prices for goods."
