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## Victory Bonds Enter on Last Lap Today

### REVOLUTION RAPIDLY SPREADS IN GERMANY

Severe Fighting on Streets of Berlin and Revolutionists Now Control the City. Palace of Crown Prince Attacked. A Run on all Banks and Panic Everywhere.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Severe fighting took place in Berlin between six and eight o'clock last night and a violent cannonade was heard from the heart of the city. The revolution is in full swing in Berlin and the Red Forces have part of the German capital, according to a Copenhagen Exchange telegraph quoting Berlin advices sent from there at three o'clock this morning. Many persons were killed and wounded before the officers surrendered. The Red Forces are in control and have restored order. Strong guards are marching through the streets. When the cannonade began the people thought the Reich Bank was being bombarded and thousands rushed to the square in front of the Crown Prince's Palace. It was discovered that other buildings were under fire. Singing the "Marseillaise," firing from the windows, the Reds then began shelling the building. The people are shouting "Long Live the Republic," and are singing the Marseillaise. When revolutionary soldiers attempted to enter a building in the heart of the city in which they supposed a number of officials were concealed, shots were fired. The Crown Prince's Palace has been seized by the revolutionary.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 9.—Reports received here state that the revolution in Germany is assuming serious proportions and spreading in the various provinces. The revolutionists are committing wild excesses and in many centres are being supported and encouraged by the populace in Essen. The women are reported to be carrying arms. Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of the Kaiser, decamped from Kiel pursued by bullets from the sailors taking part in the naval mutiny.

### SCHLESWIG HOLSTEIN NOW A REPUBLIC

LONDON, NOV. 10.—Schleswig-Holstein, the Prussian province formerly belonging to Denmark, has been proclaimed a republic. The Danish German border has been closed by order of the new government so as to prevent the escape of high German officials.

### LAST MINUTE FLASHES

The London Express says the armistice terms are more stringent than forecasted and Germany is completely deprived of all military power on land, sea and air. The new German government announces that it is in full accord with all parts.

### HONOUR FLAG UNFURLED

A pleasing ceremony took place after church at the city Hall yesterday when the Governor General's Honor Flag—presented to the city as the result of it having reached its Victory Loan objective—was formally unfurled. Mayor Wright presided over a large audience and brief addresses were delivered by Mr. C. H. B. Longworth, chairman of the Provincial Committee, Premier Arsenault and Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh. All referred to the success which was accompanying the canvass for Victory Bonds and confidence was expressed in the objective of the province being overtopped.

### HOW GERMAN EMBASSY CONFERRED WITH FOCH

On Presentation of Terms of Armistice Revealing to Embassy the Magnitude of Their Defeat They Asked for Cessation of Hostilities in Interests of Humanity. Foch Flatly Refused. Permission was Granted to Embassy to Send Courier to Spa. His Return Delayed by Hun Barrage.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—Germany's envoys were received by Marshal Foch Friday morning at 9 o'clock in a railroad car in which the Commander-in-Chief of the Allied Forces has his headquarters, according to the Petit Journal. When the German credentials had been opened and verified, Mathias Erzberger leading the enemy delegation, speaking in French announced that the German government had been advised by President Wilson that Marshal Foch was qualified to communicate to them the Allies conditions and had appointed them plenipotentiaries to make cognizance of terms and eventually sign an armistice.

Marshal Foch then read in a loud voice dwelling upon each word. Germans were prepared by semi-official communication for the stipulation as a whole but hearing set forth in detail the concrete demands seemed to bring them for the first time full realization of the extent of the German defeat. They made few observations merely pointing out material difficulties standing in the way of carrying out some quite secondary clauses. Then Erzberger asked for a suspending of hostilities in the interests of humanity. This request

Marshal Foch flatly refused. The delegates, having obtained permission to send a courier to Spa and communicate with that place by wireless withdrew.

### PROGRESS OF ALLIES BECOMES A MARCH

Allies Advance Five to Eight Miles a Day. Enemy Retiring on Whole Front. Maubeuge, the Last German Stronghold has been Occupied by Allies, also Avesnes and Other Important Positions.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The capture of the important town of Avesnes and the occupation of the western portion of Tournai are reported in Field Marshal Haig's official communication tonight. Both north and south of Avesnes the British troops have passed the line of the Avesnes, Maubeuge Road. On the left we have taken Malicourt, Fayt Le France, Dour and Thulin and are advancing along the Mangonde Canal. Farther north his flank is threatened by our advance. On this battle front the enemy has commenced to withdraw South of Tournai we have captured Conde and crossing the Scheldt Canal south of the town of Antoing have taken La Plaigne and Belloy we hold the western portion of Tournai. Since November 1 we have captured about 18,000 prisoners and 700 guns.

MAUBEUGE CAPTURED BY ALLIES

LONDON, Nov. 10.—General Haig says today the Fortress of Maubeuge has been captured by the guards of the 62 Division. We have made good progress south of that town and are well east of the Avesnes Maubeuge Road north of Tournai. We are established on the east bank of the Scheldt about Perrines and Berchem. These two towns are about nine miles apart.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Maubeuge captured today by the British was the last important French fortress in the hands of the Germans. Before the war it was considered a fortress of the first class and guarded the Namur Charleroi route into France by way of the Sambre river.

### Kaiser and Crown Prince Abdicate

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—It is officially announced that the Kaiser has abdicated. Deputy Erzberger, who is to be made Imperial German Chancellor, is a Social Democrat and President of the main committee of the Reichstag.

Wilhelm second King of Wurttemberg, abdicated on Friday night. Krupp Works at Essen are in hands of revolutionists. Krupp Von Bohlen and Bertha Krupp arrested.

The Kaiser has arrived in Holland at the town of Deisteech near Utrecht.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 10.—News of Emperor Williams' abdication was received on Saturday afternoon at Berlin with general rejoicing which was tempered with the fear that it came too late.

PARIS, NOV. 10.—The Kaiser and Crown Prince signed their abdication at Staff Headquarters in the presence of Von Hindenburg.

AMSTERDAM, NOV. 10.—A regency will be set up in the German Empire and the Crown Prince will have to renounce all claim to the Throne. Maximilian will be in office until it is accomplished. The Duke of Brunswick and his successor have abdicated and all western Germany is seething with revolution. There are runs on every bank in Berlin and panic reigns everywhere.

### ENEMY'S RETREAT BECOMES PRECIPITATE

PARIS, Nov. 10.—French troops this morning renewed their pursuit of the Germans. The French official statement issued today says the retreat of the enemy is becoming more and more precipitate. Everywhere along the line the Germans are abandoning great quantities of war material. Canon, numerous vehicles of all descriptions and in some instances entire railroad trains have been captured by Foch's forces.

### Canada's Ship-Building Programme

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—Results of the great Canadian ship-building programme announced by Hon. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine and Fisheries early this year will shortly be in evidence. Before the end of the year four steel ships, one of 3,750 tons one of 4,300 tons and two each of 8,100 tons will be launched. Fifteen ships will be launched between January 1st and June 1st while the following six months will witness the launching of 12 more ships or 31 in all, representing an outlay of from \$50,000,000 to \$60,000,000.

### Killed in Action

Mr. Peter Hughes, Pownal Street, City received the sad news Thursday morning that his son, Pte. Milo Hughes, had died of wounds received on the 26th of October. Pte. Hughes left here with the Depot Battalion early this year and was with the 85th Batt. Thursday's sad message was the first intimation his family had that he had been wounded and the shock is a severe one to the family in which they have the sympathy of all.

Private Hughes left Charlottetown March 6th, 1918 for Amherst and from there was transferred to the 85th. He crossed to England in the early part of April where he served five months. He crossed to France in the early part of September, where he met his death at the early age of 26. Pte. Hughes is survived by his parent, six sisters and three brothers.
