(By The Canadian Press) Steve Gromek yesterday came up with the best pitching performance in either of the major leagues this season when he twirled a two-hitter for Cleveland Indians over St. Louis Browns in the American League. Final score was 8-2 and the only hits off Gromek were homers by Jack Graham and Dick Kokos in the fifth inning.

Boston Red Sox finally got going to beat Philadelphia Athletics 4-0 after dropping two straight.

New York Yankees made it three-in-a-row over Washington with a 2-1 triumph.

Chicago White Sox counted their first victory, a 5-2 decision over Detroit Tigers.

Cleveland offensive against the Browns included a three-run homer by Larry Doby and another circuit blow by Joe Gordon. Gromek walked only one man

and struck out six, facing only 30 batters.

Pitcher Phil Marchildon of the Athletics blew up in the ninth inning with two out as Boston scored all its runs.

Hank Bauer's ninth-inning double gave New York victory over Washington.

Johnny Lindell advanced to start the ninth. He singled when Sherry Robertson dropped Tommy Henrich's liner. Bauer then doubled to break it up.

Detroit's sensational outfielder, Johnny Groth, had to settle for one single in his two official times at bat. On his other appearances, he walked and was hit by the pitcher.

The day's activities left Groth with a record of six hits in nine times at bat in the three-game series against Chicago.

The progressive little town of Kensington has never taken a back seat to any centre when it came to looking after their youth from the standpoint of recreational activities. They had pee-wee hockey players getting their regular practices at the Kensington Rink some time before the "Physical Fitness" program was organized and pee-wees and paperweights came into their own in the larger centres. The small fry also played in organized softball leagues quite a number of years ago. The rapid strides they have made in the past few years, however, surpasses anything they had done before along these lines, and thanks to a group of citizens who appreciate the value of sports activities for their youngsters, they are now ahead, if not ahead of the larger centres in their efforts for the welfare of youth.

Two home runs and three doubles helped pitcher Johnny Vander Meer of Cincinnati to an easy, 5-0 victory over St. Louis.

Bon Scheffing smashed a homer with one aboard in the eighth to give Chicago Cubs a 4-3 edge over Pittsburgh Pirates.

Boston Braves and Philadelphia Phillies were tied.

Two-run homers by Sid Gordon and Mickey Livingston brought the Giants from behind Brooklyn after they had been blanked for five innings by Preacher Roe.

Gordon, switched from third base to right field, smacked his four-bagger in the sixth.

Livingston, catching for the Giants in place of Walker Cooper, duplicated the stunt in the seventh frame.

The Cincinnati victory gave the Reds undisputed possession of first place in the National League.

Hank Sauer and Jimmy Bloodworth hit the Red homers, each with a runner on base. Howie Pollet was the losing pitcher.

Vander Meer, who allowed five hits, got stronger as the game progressed, retiring the last 11 batters in order. Pollet gave up only five hits, but all were for extra bases.
