Lost Fortune Of Lord Chaplin

LONDON, July 23.—Surprise has been caused by the smallness of the estate left by the late Viscount Chaplin, whose will has just been proved.

Lord Chaplin, who died in May, aged 82, left property valued at only £4,888, with net personalty nil.

For many years Lord Chaplin drew a pension of £1,200 a year as an ex-Cabinet Minister. On more than one occasion he was attacked by political opponents on this ground, especially after he voted against the Old Age Pensions Bill, introduced by the Liberal Government.

The mystery of his small estate is increased by the fact that on coming of age Lord Chaplin inherited the Blankney estate in Lincolnshire, then valued at £500,000 a year. Its value, however, and worth from 30,000 to 40,000 afterwards enormously decreased.

For many years Lord Chaplin's winnings on the turf were notable. He not only won about £100,000 by Hermit's victory in the Derby of 1887, but the colt earned him nearly £15,000 for several years afterwards.

In a speech at Wimbledon in January 1910, Lord Chaplin said that he had made a profit of about £12,000 a year for 25 years by breeding horses.

To his servant, William Northwood, Lord Chaplin left £500 and all his stock of poultry at Hall Farm, Brixworth, and to his former servant, Charles Hammond (or his widow) £250, stipulating that the bequest should only be paid if the estate permits of it.

His other bequests are of a small personal character, the remainder of the estate passing to his daughter, the Hon. Florence Hoare.

Man Of Seventy To The Rescue

He held the child above water with one hand, while he grasped a boat with the other till assistance came.

A Question of Music
