USED DYNAMITE NEAR BOUNDARY

American Fisherman in Border Waters Killing Fish by Unlawful Means are Reported to Ottawa and Washington—A Canadian Cruiser Sent to the Scene

ST. STEPHEN, June 18.—(Special)—On Saturday between Welchpool and Eastport American fishermen were exploding dynamite in American waters near the international boundary line, doing great injury in Canadian waters.

Local parties immediately advised the Canadian government and the Department of Marine and Fisheries instructed the Commander of the Government cruiser Curlew to proceed at once to the scene of the explosion and render every assistance possible to protect the fishing in Canadian waters.

Representations have also been made to Washington through the American Consul at Welchpool, Campobello.

NEW YORK YACHTS IN BAD WEATHER

New York, June 16.—J. T. & G. C. Meyers Yacht, Atair, of the New York Yacht club's thirty footers, was the winner in that class today, defeating A. B. & L. W. Alker's Alexa by one minute seven seconds, after sailing over a 15 mile course on Long Island Sound under the worst conditions of wind and weather for racing seen on the Sound in years.

Seventeen of her yachts started in the small classes. The winners were: The Kretz Quik, the Tillium II, the Hout, the Paumotu and the Vireon. The time of the Atair was two hours 32 minutes 15 seconds.

Sumner, all of Moncton and Sheriff McQueen of Dorchester, returned tonight from Botaford Parish where they went to search for the two Creamer children who so mysteriously disappeared from their home about two months ago.

The most important discovery was a piece of red thread in the edge of the woods where foot prints were discovered soon after the babies disappeared and which was identified as belonging to the missing boy's clothes.

The lad carries the mail and becoming weary at the non-arrival of the train laid down on the track between the sleepers and went to sleep.

Everybody expected to find his mangled remains, but instead they saw a half-dazed boy slowly getting on his feet.

RIOT AND REVOLT GROW IN RUSSIA

Fearful Riots and Massacres—The Terrible Scenes Described—The Constitutional Democrats Ready To Throw in Their Lot with The Revolutionists.

BIALYSTOCK, June 18.—(Special)—This City today presents an indescribable scene of arson and pillage.

Every Jewish house and store is wrecked and everywhere are weeping women, hunting for traces of killed or wounded relatives.

Soldiers are everywhere, and martial law prevails, but in spite of precautions, riots burst out every little while.

On account of the destruction of the provision stores famine is threatened.

The scene at the Jewish hospitals is sickening.

The lawns outside are covered with mangled corpses and the walks along which the wounded were carried are stained with blood.

Prof. Mikuloff, M. Vilaver and others counselled caution saying it was not yet time to begin the storm, but the Radicals were in the majority.

The Government seems to fear a repetition of the November mutiny at Cronstadt, where the sailors and marines and collars, and workmen are reported to be extremely turbulent.

The streets are filled with troops and well to do inhabitants are hurrying leaving the island on which the town is situated.

2,000 MEN IN SEARCH OF WIVES

BRUSSELS, June 16.—Two thousand bachelors from all parts of Belgium many from France and some from Germany swept down on the village of Eaux-saines-Lalating today to find brides.

The men began to arrive early in the morning, but it was toward noon before trainloads of them appeared. There were all sorts and conditions of men.

One man of 72 has travelled all the way from Luxembourg to find a wife, to whom he promised a dowry that would place her beyond want. There were tradesmen, clerks, mechanics, miners, laborers indeed, no branch of trade appeared to be unrepresented.

Gay banners of welcome, triumphal arches with mottoes of encouragement for prospective husbands, figures of Cupid and hearts pierced by arrows were to be seen everywhere.

All marched to the "Grand Place," where there was an open-air concert. The bands played nothing but nuptial marches and love songs. At the close an adjournment was made to the town hall, where the young ladies took their places at tables on which stood bowls of pink roses with such mottoes as "Hope on," "Love," "Be Trusting and 'Have Faith."

A vacant chair was left beside each girl, and at a given signal the men with matrimonial intent made a rush to secure the seats. Then coffee and a sweet cake were served, followed by a bonbon tasting of licorice. When this was over the lady president made a speech on "The art of pleasing man," which was wildly applauded. Dancing in the open air ended the programme of the festivities.

DISSATISFIED WITH JAPANESE

PEKIN, June 17.—Widespread and growing dissatisfaction is manifested by American and European merchants, bank and shipping firms against the Japanese administration in Manchuria.

The Japanese occupation under the Portsmouth treaty will continue until next April, and in the meantime foreign commerce is almost blocked, the Japanese merchants gaining advantage which makes it increasingly difficult to compete with them.

Foreign goods entered Manchuria through Port Newchwang, where the regular Chinese custom duties are levied, while the Japanese import through Daity and Antung without duty.

Mukden and Antung are nominally opened to foreign trade, but foreigners are not permitted to go inland without Japanese passes, while many Japanese merchants, miners and promoters are allowed to travel the country free.

Foreign merchants complain that obstacles are placed in the way of shipping goods to the interior from Newchwang, as the Japanese control of the railway gives these special advantages.
