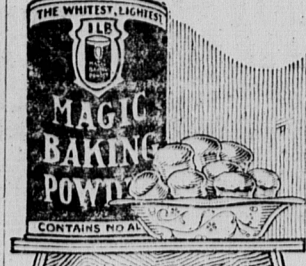

AFTER THE TUMBLE

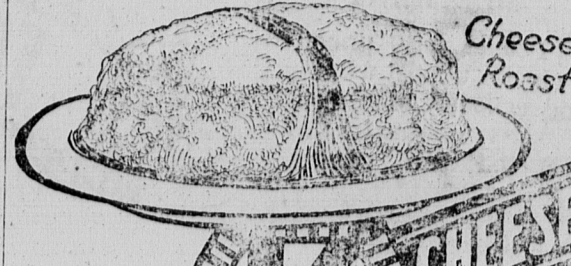

N. B. Court Refuses Appeal

FREDERICTON, March 7.—The Court of Appeal of Supreme Court of New Brunswick refused the application made by Mr. J. B. Baxter, K. C., on behalf of Mr. R. H. Hanson, M. P., for York-Sunbury for leave to appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada from the decision of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick which by ordering new trial upset the jury's verdict for \$100 which Mr. Hanson had obtained against the Gleaner Limited in his suit for libel in which he claimed \$25,000 damages upon grounds that he was charged with dishonorable and unprofessional conduct in an editorial that had been published charging mutilation of a document of the Supreme Court.
