

# MANY NEW MEMBERS FOR COMMONS

## Picturesque Political Figures Numbered Among Missing.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Oct. 16.—When the Speaker calls for order in the new House of Commons next January or February many picturesque political figures will be numbered among the missing, casualties of the election.

Never in Canadian history have so many new members trooped into the House after an election. Many will take the places of men who have become national figures in recent years, veterans of the House and veterans of politics.

Ten members of the Bennett Government were left at home, some veterans, some tyros. For instance, Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways, had been coming to Ottawa since 1917 and off and on since 1921 had been a cabinet minister. At the other extreme, Hon. Lucien Gendron, Minister of Marine, never was a member of the House, being appointed to the cabinet a few weeks before the election.

Among the veterans who will watch the political whirligig from their own fireplaces for the next few years are Hon. R. B. Hanson, Minister of Trade and Commerce, a member since 1921; J. A. Barrette, one of the old Quebec Nationalists who re-entered the House in 1930 as a Conservative; Henri Bourassa, fiery leader of the Nationalists in 1911, stormy petrel of Quebec politics in the early years of the century and a member of the House again since 1925; Hon. Raymond Morand, Deputy Speaker last session; Eccles J. Gott who used to enliven the House with bantering exchanges with Jean Francois Pouliot, who, incidentally retained his Quebec seat.

Still others left behind were George Spotton of North Huron who outweighed any man in Parliament; General A. E. Ross of Kingston, affectionately known as "Hindenburg" to ex-service men; Dr. Peter McGibbon who entered the House in 1917; Speaker Bowman of the last House; W. W. Kennedy of Winnipeg, chairman of the Price Spreads Commission; John Vallance who used to lead the singing during divisions along with Fred Totzke, his deskmate, who was not a candidate.

All the veterans did not meet defeat. Hon. Charles Macdill, a member since 1900, the dean of the House, came through and so did R. S. White, who entered the Commons back in the days of Sir John Macdonald in 1888 and returned in 1925.

Georges Bouchard, French-Canadian author, will be back along with Sam Jacobs, the wit of the House; Hon. Ernest Lapointe, the new Prime Minister's deskmate; C. G. "Chubby" Power from Quebec City; Sir Eugene Fiset and Sir George Ferley, the two knights in the last House; Tommy Church of Toronto; Hon. W. R. Motherwell, former of political phrases and western veteran; A. W. Neil, the slow-speaking, droll Independent from the Pacific coast; Tom Reid of New Westminster, bagpipes and all; Olof Hanson, native-born Swede and Hon. Ian MacKenzie who could speak only Gaelic until well into his teens.

# Tid-Bits For Tea Time Made In a Minute

## Attractive Little Cakes Essential At Buffet Parties

(By Katherine Baker) Sandwiches and beverages, and what else? is the question in every hostess' mind as she plans an afternoon tea party, bridge, or supper refreshments. Even the smartly original women who have plenty of sandwich substitutes, must have some interesting sweet for her guests to nibble with their last cup of coffee. These little "nibbles" cakes add much to the appearance of the tea table or buffet table. They may be delicately puffed, or crisply thin, but either way should look dainty and light and toothsome.

Macaroons have been one of the prettiest and most popular little cakes since some clever cook invented them. And the standard macaroon can be made in a minute from this carefully tested recipe. That funny "soapy" taste that is often found in macaroons comes from stale, poor quality coconut. Fresh, moist coconut is easily obtained in air-tight packages and cans—the long shredded type is called southern style, and the short shreds to be used in batter and liquids, premium shred. For macaroons of course, the long, tender shreds are used.

### COCONUT MACAROONS

5 tablespoons sugar  
2 egg whites, stiffly beaten  
3-4 cup coconut, southern style shred  
1-4 teaspoon almond extract  
Beat sugar into egg whites and continue beating until mixture stiffens again. Beat in coconut and almond extract. Drop by teaspoons on waxed paper on baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees F.) 20 minutes or until done. Cool slightly, dash cold water on under side of paper on which macaroons were baked, and remove macaroons with spatula or broad blade knife. Makes 18.

# Communists Candidates Poll 26,789 Votes

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Oct. 16.—Thirteen Communist candidates in the Dominion election polled 26,789 votes according to a Canadian Press compilation. The total is subject to increase as missing polls are reported for eight constituency votes now incomplete. Tim Buck in Winnipeg south was the only Communist candidate who did not forfeit his deposit.

The votes reported for Communist candidates in the election last Monday follow (X indicates incomplete): Cape Breton South, N. S., J. E. McLachlan, 5160;

1 cup powdered sugar  
1 cup coconut, premium shred  
1 cup finely chopped dates

### COCONUT DREAMS

1 cup sweetened condensed milk  
4 cups (1-3 pound) coconut, premium shred  
1 tablespoon vanilla  
1-8 teaspoon salt  
Combine milk, coconut, salt, and vanilla, and mix well. Drop teaspoon on greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 10 minutes. Makes three dozen cookies. If desired, 3-4 cup chopped figs, candied cherries or currants may be added to mixture before baking. These cookies have the chewy texture and sweetness of macaroons.

# State Medicine Experiment For Manitoba

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WINNIPEG, Oct. 16.—State medicine throughout Manitoba, if an experiment about to be made in a small area proves successful, was envisaged here today by Hon. I. B. Griffiths, provincial minister of Health and Public Welfare. Preparations were being made by the Government to establish a unit area in which a form of state medicine will be tried out, he said. The ultimate scheme would involve free medical, hospital and drug service to individuals, the cost to be borne "probably by provincial and municipal governments out of taxes."

# RICH OKLAHOMAN'S SON UNDER GUARD

MIAMI, Okla., Oct. 17.—A strong police guard was established yesterday at the home of Henry Hossman, wealthy Oklahoman, after a suspected kidnap plot aimed at his seven year old son, Henry Edward Hossman, had been thwarted.

The report spread rapidly that one of the suspected men in the attempted kidnaping was Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, who once had a hideout in this section. The family refused to comment on the possibility that Karpis was one of two men who appeared at the school here yesterday, and sought to get the principal, Doris Vailey, to release the boy to them.

State Crime Bureau operatives here revealed that they had asked the Department of Justice to help investigate the case.

Karpis was reported with Harry Campbell, his desperado-partner, in Lake Hamilton, Ark., near Hot Springs, last week. The school principal refused to discuss the case other than to say that the two men appeared at the school in a car. One sat in the car, and the other came to the schoolhouse, asking that the boy be released to him, saying his folks wanted him.

She refused to request, and the pair drove off. Later they returned to the school with a note which, according to state officers, was plainly not genuine.

# MRS. AMBROSE SMALL IS DEAD AT TORONTO

TORONTO, Oct. 17.—Mrs. Ambrose Small, wife of the wealthy Toronto theatre owner whose disappearance in 1919 was an international sensation, died here yesterday. She had been ill for several years.

Mrs. Small was one of the last persons to see her husband alive. A long series of court suits resulted from her application for probate of the will which named her sole beneficiary of the estate, said to exceed \$1,000,000.

In 1922, action was brought to have her removed as trustee of the estate. In 1923 the court refused to declare Small legally dead. This decision was later reversed.

# ROCKEFELLER HAS GREAT-GRANDCHILD

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Mr. and Mrs. John D. Rockefeller III, last night announced the birth of a daughter, named Sandra Ferry Rockefeller. Both mother and daughter were reported "doing well" at Presbyterian Hospital. The girl is the first child of the grandson of the retired oil magnate.

# Anti-Semitic Turn Taken In Rumania

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BUCHAREST, Rumania, Oct. 16.—The peasant fight to eliminate Magda Lupescu, King Carol's mistress, as a power in Rumanian affairs took a strong anti-Semitic turn today.

A broadside of opposition leaflets unloosed upon the city emphasized Madame Lupescu, described as the "chief of staff of the Camarilla (intrigants)," is Jewish. The pamphlets charged that through her influence a disproportionate number of Jews are getting soft jobs. She is accused of getting her relatives on the public payroll.
