Washington Gives Warm Welcome To Mexico's President

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—President Truman and Mexico's visiting President, Miguel Aleman, exchanged pledges of good will and peace today as one of the most impressive welcomes Washington ever gave to a foreign dignitary got underway.

President Aleman came here primarily on a social visit, but it may lead to substantial financial aid for Mexico. The World Bank announced today that Mexico had applied for a loan of \$208,875,000 for irrigation, power projects and other industrial undertakings. Mexico also desires a loan of about \$175,000,000 from the United States export-import bank.

Truman, in a brief welcoming speech after Aleman alighted from "The Sacred Cow", the American President's personal plane, recalled with pleasure his visit last month in Mexico.

"We (the Western Hemisphere countries) have, as a group of free nations, the moral strength, and moreover have the proved good will of our several countries to find equitable and peaceful solutions to differences of any nature that arise among us."

President Aleman said in reply that the relationship between Mexico and the United States is "a clear example of self-respecting co-operation and of solidarity without loss of independence."

Truman and members of his Cabinet met the visiting president at the gaily-decorated Washington national airport.

In a brief welcoming address, President Truman declared: "The nations of this hemisphere are confronted today with many problems . . .

"We have, as a group of free nations, the moral strength, and moreover have the proved good will of our several countries to find equitable and peaceful solutions to differences of any nature that arise among us who live in the New World."

President Aleman replied: "In a world where skepticism and discord still becloud peace, our confidence, the confidence of all the Americas, in the fitness of democracy, is one of the most valuable assets which we have inherited in our hemisphere."

In Memoriam

CECIL IGNATIUS BRADLEY

Death, which is at all times sad and always leaves in its wake a great sense of loss and a train of broken hearts, was especially so in the case of the late Cecil Ignatius Bradley whose death occurred in Charlottetown on Sunday morning, March 2nd, 1947, in his forty-first year.

The deceased who was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bradley of Kelly's Cross, was well and favorably known in Charlottetown and surrounding districts. At an early age he left his home in Kelly's Cross and came to work as stockman on the farm of the present Premier Jones, which position he held for about seven years. He later worked for a number of years at Raymond's Ranch in Southport, and came to the city in 1939 to start a business for himself. For several years he successfully conducted a Grocery Business on Grafton Street, in the stand now occupied by Young's Grocery. In 1942 he accepted a position with The Eastern Hay and Feed and was a valued member of the staff from then until about two months before his death when he was forced to leave off due to ill-health.

The late Mr. Bradley was a man of quiet disposition, but of sterling character, and all who were privileged to know him intimately can readily vouch for his many fine qualities of heart and mind. He was not only a model of honesty and integrity, but was truly a devoted husband and father, a kind neighbor and a loyal friend.

In 1936, he married Miss Helen Morrison of this city, who survives him to mourn her loss along with her five small children, the oldest of whom is ten years old, while the youngest is but one year. The children are: Anne, Kathleen, Francis, Emmett and David.

Also left to mourn the loss of a loving son and brother are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bradley, who still reside in the old homestead, his sister Mary (Mrs. John Cusack) of Ennville and five brothers: Maurice, Wilfred and Edwin of Kelly's Cross, Joseph of Bolton, Mass., and Charlie in Woodstock, New Brunswick. To all of whom much sympathy is extended.

The funeral was held on the morning of March 4th, to St. Dunstan's Basilica, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the pastor, Rev. Patrick McMahon, who also performed the committal rites at the grave.

The Knights of Columbus Society, of which the deceased was an honored member, attended the funeral in a body as did also many of the members of the B. I. S. Society.

The large number of masses, the great profusion of flowers, the numerous letters, telegrams and messages of sympathy, all speak eloquently of the popularity and high regard in which the deceased held by his numerous friends and acquaintances. And so passes a true Christian gentleman, a good citizen and a loyal friend.

May his Soul rest in Peace. Amen.
