



This morning the racing cavalcade moved on to Bridgewater where two days race meet in connection with the Exhibition there October 1st and 2nd. Bridgewater track and grounds is a model of neatness and the horsemen like to go there.

The Garden of the Gulf Good Will Race Meet Wednesday and Thursday ended in a blaze of glory. The racing was without exaggeration spectacular and seldom in our memory at least have we seen anything to equal the Free for All, but every race on the card was good. The horsemen went away pleased with their visit and expressing the hope that the Good Will Race Meet will be a permanent fixture here.

Some statistics of the meeting may prove interesting. The fastest race paced was the first in the Free for All, won by Tom Grattan 2:05 in 2:07. The fastest heat trotted was the third heat of the Free for All Trot, won by Paul Abbe, 2:11-2 in 2:11. There were 20 heats paced during the meeting in the average time of 2:11-3/4. There were 6 heats trotted in the average time of 2:13-1/2. Nova Scotia owned horses won three of the eight races, names of the 2:13 Trot and Pace D. W. Munroe, New Glasgow, N. S. driven by Joe O'Brien, the winner, the Free for All Trot with Watch'm 2:11, owned by Alderman Frank Adams, Halifax, driven by Billy Hood, the winner, and the Free for All Trot and Pace with Rainey G. Henley 2:06 a winner for Thomas Watson of Halifax, driven by Roy Barnett. New Brunswick owned horses won two races, the Jun'or Free for All with Joe Direct 2:07 the winner for owner-driver Thomas Elter, Moncton, and the 2:22 Pace with Skippydale 2:14-2 a winner for owner-driver Thomas Elter. Prince Edward Island owned horses won three races, Lady Hal 2:13-2 owned by Bell, Clark & McNeill and driven by Well McNeill, winner of the 2:27 Trot and Pace. Darkey Kamuck 2:13-2, owned and driven by Willard Kelly, Southport, winning the Classified Trot, and Major Bowes, 2:10-2, owned by Mrs. Sampson Grady, Summerside, driven by Joe O'Brien, winning the 2:15 Trot and Pace.

The following horses reduced their records during the meeting: Silent Joe from 2:11-2 to 2:10-3/4. Paul Abbe from 2:11-2 to 2:11. Darkey Kamuck from 2:14-2 to 2:13-1/2. Oliver Grattan from 2:12-2 to 2:11-2. Peter at Court from 2:12-4 to 2:11-2. I-dy Hal, making her second start of her career as a comparatively green pacer (sired by Sampson Hal 2:3-4) took a record of 2:13-1/2. Abbe Jackson, three-year-old by Abbe worthy, owned and driven by Well McNeill trotted to a record against time of 2:24-1/4.

For the benefit of our readers who have not seen the issues of this paper for Thursday and Friday with the splendid descriptive reports by Pat Power, we are making a brief summary of the events of the two days meet.

WEDNESDAY, SEPT. 26th. 2:13 TROT AND PACE. There were five starters quite evenly matched, with the exception of Silent Joe who stood out a bit from the others. First Heat—He drew the pole and made every post a winning one although Oliver Grattan was close to his sulky wheel at the finish. Time 2:11-1/4, a new record for Silent Joe. Oliver Grattan was second, Bonnie Scott, third, Bebe McElwyn fourth, Oakhurst Queen fifth. This had eight starters and was quite a snawled affair but Lady Hal had too much step for the others, being master of the situation all through. It was her second start of her career and she won in straight heats, taking a new record of 2:13-1/2. In the First Heat Pat Worthly was in front at the turn but was overtaken by Hilda Budlong at the quarter pole, then Bonnie Budlong went to the front but at the half Lady Hal, pacing very fast, went into the lead and from there on never relinquished it. In the stretch drive it was a battle between Lady Hal and Bonnie Budlong but Bonnie could not get nearer than her sulky wheel. Jack Clyde, the 3-year-old pacer who got away a little back of the rest, was a close third with Margaret Jean, fourth, Peter Reamore fifth. Second Heat—The contest in this heat was again between Lady Hal and Bonnie Budlong, with Lady Hal having too much steam in the stretch drive. Peter Reamore was third, Margaret Jean fourth, Jack Clyde fifth. In the third heat, Lady Hal, scoring in last position, put on an amazing burst of speed in the last half, caught the others and finished first. Max Macon went the distance for the Royals, allowing nine well-scattered blows.

As early as the first inning, when Montreal picked up five runs, the handwriting was on the wall that the fans could expect some free hitting. But little did they expect their heroes would do so much cannonading against the reputed Red Birds, who boast five .300 hitters on their lineup. Two of the Montreal circuit smashes were for four runs apiece, with Alex Kampouris coming through with the first in the starting inning and Jack Graham pounding another in the third frame. Paul Campbell picked up the other homer to lead off a three-run out-burst in the second inning. Chase and Jack Graham, both of the way, that was all the Royals needed for victory, despite the fact the Red Birds kept pecking away at Macon's offerings. The last so-called paw was in time form, although at times had to be helped out of a few tight spots by some smart Montreal hitting.

The birds pulled out two runs in the third inning, and in the sixth picked up a single run. Their last scoring stand came in the eighth, when three runs came in.

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Dodgers Confident Crew As Man. Durocher Names Hurlers Who Will Start

By JUDSON BAILEY Associated Press Sport Editor NEW YORK, Sept. 26—(AP)—A song of defiance came from Brooklyn Dodgers today as Manager Leo (Lippy) Durocher gave the public a peek at his strategy for the World Series with New York Yankees. His four starting pitchers will be Whitlow Wyatt, Kirby Higbe, Curt Davis and Fred Fitzsimmons, although not necessarily in that order he disclosed, and the first fireman called for relief every day will be chubby Hugh Casey.

This hardly was startling information for the roomful of reporters who gathered at Durocher's suite in a midtown hotel, but the dapper, talkative skipper of the new National League champions went on from there. "My gang is confident. I know they're not afraid of 'em. I won't make a prediction who will win. The only thing I know for sure is that the first game will start at 1:30 Wednesday in Yankee Stadium and we'll be there. But you can bet your life it will be a hell of a battle. They talk about you can't make a mistake against the Yankees or they'll blow your brains out. Well, I'll say this. They better not make a mistake against us, either. We've got power, too. They better not groove one for Lavagetto, or Camilli, or Medwick, or Reese."

Not Worried About Hurlers Then in a discussion of his pitchers' chances, he added: "I'm not worried about Wyatt. He'll take care of himself. "Higbe? Well, that's hard to say. Higbe just don't know from nuttin'." "Davis pitched a shutout against the Yankees in Carolina last Spring. "Anyways, these guys are my pitchers. They won the pennant for me and they're entitled to pitch in the series. We didn't win it with Albona, or French, or Drake." The same reasoning prompted Durocher to declare that he would adhere to Cookie Lavagetto at third base and Joe Medwick in leftfield, no matter whether the Yankees used right- or left-handed pitchers. During the heat of the pennant race he regularly installed Lew Riggs at third against right-handed pitchers and used Jim Washell in the outfield against southpaws.

Durocher will also start all the games at shortstop, he said. "I don't expect to play unless I have too. Of course, if I have to put in a pinchhitter for Reese during a game, I'll have to go out there. But they didn't win with me at short, they won with the kid." "I'm not worried about Camilli or Medwick, or Herman tightening up. They're old hands and they know how to pitch. That's why Owen—he's a tough little nut and he won't crack either." Durocher revealed for the first time that his peppy catcher had been playing on his nerve in recent days. "He'll be all right in the series, but he hurt his left leg bad at St. Louis—skum it clear to the bone and then a ball came out right where it was hurt."

Yankees Take Twin Bill From Senators; Hurlers Give 3-hit Performances

NEW YORK, Sept. 26—(AP)—Spud Chandler and Marius Russo showed today that they are ready for the Dodgers by pitching three-hitters as the Yankees whipped Washington Senators 4-1 and 1-4 and hung up a new American League record for double plays. Chandler turned in his masterful performance in the first game to give his 10th victory of the year. Phil Rizzuto's first-inning homer provided Russo with his margin over Young Early Wynn in the second game. The victory was Russo's 14th.

The Yanks came up with two twin killings in each game to run their total for the season to 190 three above the mark established by Cleveland Indians in 1928—the same year Cincinnati Reds hung up the Major League record of 104. The double victory also gave the Yanks 100 triumphs for the fifth year under Manager Joe McCarthy in which they won 100 or more games. At Detroit, big Al Benton, who usually comes to the rescue of his mates, got some assistance himself as he pitched Tigers into a tie for the League's third place by defeating Chicago White Sox, 4-3. At St. Louis, Bobby Feller pitched a one-hit game and his 25th victory of the season, defeating Browns in a nightcap of a double-header, 3-2, after Cleveland Indians had dropped the opener, 6-5, in 11 innings.

Can. Football Season gets Underway today

But the squabble should serve only to add lustre to the season's opening today. The newly-formed eastern rugby football union, through President Jim McCaffrey, has ruled that Beach fullback Bobby Porter is ineligible until he obtains an amateur card from the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada. This deprives Beaches of the services of their star player for the clash against Toronto Argonauts, one of the three dishes to be served to football-fandom. The atmosphere will be somewhat more peaceful at Ottawa where the Rough Riders, scorn of some of their best heavyweights, will tangle with Montreal Bulldogs, most of whom have been gallivanting around eastern gridirons for years with various Montreal clubs.

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
