## FINANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 2—(AP)—The stock market ended one of its worst weeks in many months Saturday with trends pointing downward.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 3 of a point at 418. The week's net drop of 19 points put the composite back to around its low of last August. It was the third successive weekly decline. While dealings never were speedy in the brief session, transfers of 308,000 shares compared with 219,400 last Saturday which were the smallest since Oct. 19.

Prominent on the losing side were U.S. Steel, Wheeling Steel, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, American Telephone, Westinghouse, Union Carbide, Eastman Kodak, J. I. Case and Santa Fe.

Among the few issues finishing moderately ahead were Kennecott, American Smelting, Wocworth and J. C. Penney.

Consolidated Oil was the liveliest mover. It sold in blocks of 500 to 5,000 shares and was off 1-8 at 6 1-2.

The only Canadian stocks to show any action were Dome Mines and International Nickel in the mining group. Each lost 1-8.

## Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, Feb. 2—(CP)—Lower prices were chalked up by all index groups in the first session of February on the Toronto exchange. Turnover was comparatively light at 170,000 shares.

Preston moved in volume of 15,000 shares and slipped down to 290 but recovered to close at 236, down only 4 cents net. Kerr-Addison weakened 10 cents to 3.50, Bralorne 15 cents to 9.85. Buffalo-Arkerite 25 to 425 and losses of 4 to 6 cents were showing finally for Amcor, Chesterville, Coniagas, Hard Rock, Malartic Gold Fields and Pickle Crow. Lake Shore declined 3-4 to 19 1-2. Prices held firm to strong for Bestie, Pam ur, Little Long Lac and Central Procupine.

Nickel and Noranda were down slightly at the close and Pend Orville off 2 cents. Steep Rock was quieter than usual and the price was up 3 cents to 1.39.

Imperial and International Petroleum dropped 1-4 to 6-8 and narrow declines came through for Brazilian, Canada Steamships, Industrial Alcohol A, Fanny Farmer, the Loblaw issues and Dominion Bridge. The Abitibi stocks weakened narrowly and losses of a point or more were netted by Canadian Breweries pfd., Dominion Foundries, International Metals pfd., Power Corporation and Fraser Voting Trust.

Home Oil lost 3 cents to 2.20 Anglo-Canadian was down 2 to 66 and Calmont 1 to 22.

## Grain

CHICAGO, Feb. 2—(AP)—A renewal of the selling pressure which has characterized trading for nine successive sessions forced wheat prices downward yesterday, but late rallies recovered part of the early losses.

Prices dropped as much as 1 1-2 cents a bushel which sent the new crop deliveries, July and September to new low levels of the season. Corn prices declined with wheat, but later rallied to near the day's top levels.

## Currencies

WINNIPEG, Feb. 2—(CP)—The price range of wheat futures prices widened a little yesterday as southern and eastern houses completed both buying and selling orders on Winnipeg grain exchange. Quotations recorded gains and losses as they shuffled back and forth within a 1-2-cent range before finishing 1-4 cent higher, May wheat at 76 3-4 and July 78 3-8 cents a bushel.
