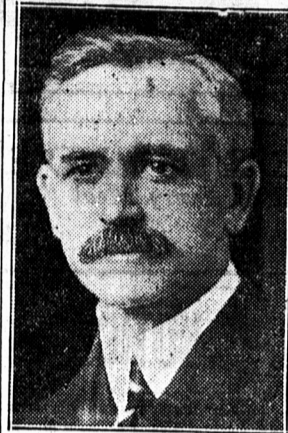
GOVT'S PLAN REJECTED BY LABOR PARTY

Suspension of Seven Hours Act Central Feature - Premier Baldwin's Speech Criticized.

London, June 16.—The government's new plan to solve the mining stoppage had a hostile reception at the hands of the Labor Party in the House of Commons today.

The Labor leaders insisted that there be no elements of a possible settlement; that it was a mere acquiescence in the mine owner's plans and its central feature suspension of the seven hours Act, had no place in the Royal Coal Commission's recommendation.

King Govt. Had Close Call ON SUDDENLY SPRUNG WANT OF CONFIDENCE MOTION

Govt. Challenged in House Almost on the Eve of Prorogation - Motion Rejected by Majority of Six-Two Progressives Support Meighen - Return of Alberta Resources Precipitates Lengthy Debate.

OTTAWA, June 16.—After a debate lasting through the day and well into the morning, the House at 2.10 a. m. rejected a Conservative motion of non-confidence by a majority of six. The vote on the motion of non-confidence was: Against 113, For 107, Government Majority 6.
