Rumania has suggested to Germany a conference of all southeastern European states at Rome, in the near future, to settle all the region's problems without recourse to war. The Axis powers' reaction to this suggestion isn't known.

Bitter Words

BUDAPEST, July 2.—(AP)—Hungarian and Rumanian officials exchanged bitter words over Transylvania tonight, and Hungary gave every sign of determination to remain that old Magyar province in one way or another.

Mobilization went full ahead, notwithstanding Germany's efforts to keep peace in the Balkans lest her own economic interests be smashed in war.

Responsible persons denied reports that a demilitarized zone had been set up on the Hungarian-Rumanian frontier.

To avoid a conflict, it was believed here, Germany might go so far as a military and political alliance with Rumania.

If this were achieved, and the Hungarian army were permitted to advance deep into Rumania through the Carpathian mountains, the Rumanian position in southeast Europe would appear to be a solid one.

Unique Tourist Attraction

In connection with the Old Home Week it would be well for our people to take the suggestion put out a few days ago by D. Leo Dolan, head of the Dominion Government Tourist Bureau that "Canadians be asked to make a list of everyone they know in the United States and to these people, their personal friends and relations they would send a long brief personal note stating that they will find it just as easy to enter Canada now as they did prior to the outbreak of the war and that Americans need no passport in coming to this country and that the Welcome Mat is still at the door. Also that for every American dollar the tourist brings into this country he will get \$1.10 in Canadian money for it.

During the coming months, Mr. Dolan emphasizes, Canada MUST attract as many tourists as possible to this country from the United States. "These tourists must be assured that they will welcome and be glad to have them and to enjoy themselves as was the case before the war broke out."

Hitler's Plans

What Hitler seeks, it appeared here, is a peaceful settlement of Hungarian-Rumanian difficulties which would provide better protection for the Rumanian oil fields on which he so depends—fields now under the shadow of Soviet guns.

In parliament, Hungarian deputy Koz-Horvath said that "military requisitioning of Transylvania by the Rumanian government is taking on the character of free looting of Hungarian property."

Rumanians were taking hostages from among the Hungarian minorities in Transylvania, he said, adding: "The Rumanian government has distributed arms to the Rumanian minorities in Transylvania with instructions to the Hungarian minority the moment the latter stir."

Deputy Koz-Horvath concluded his speech by shouting: "The country behind any decision of the government to act!"

In another illustration of the unrest in the Balkans, Belgrade reported the receipt of diplomatic advice from Bucharest which stated that some extremist members of the pro-Fascist Rumanian Iron Guard were fostering a movement aimed at compelling King Carol to abdicate in favour of a Rumanian and northern Bucovina to Soviet Russia.

1,000 Weekly Recruited

In another air announcement here, Air Minister Power told the Commons that recruiting for the Royal Canadian Air Force was proceeding at the rate of about 1,000 a week following out the government's decision to step up the training effort.

He said 115,000 men have requested and received information covering air force enlistment since the war started. More than 25,000 passed the medical examination and were trained, and of these 13,000 enlisted.

"The balance are being called up as rapidly as circumstances permit," Mr. Power added.

A statement from the Air Ministry said recruiting of armoured for the air force would start immediately. These men will repair and keep in order aircraft, machine guns, bombing appliances and everything connected with armament of the planes.

A return tabled in the Commons stated that 15 fields constructed or under construction for the R.C.A.F. number 82. The return said 88 fields would be used in the air training plan and there were 1,000 fields under the direction of the Civil Aviation branch of the Transport Department.

Work Well Advanced

Mr. Hows said that work is well advanced on all orders for planes required for the air training plan and arrangements have been completed for purchase of some 5,000 engines. Originally most of these engines were to have come from Britain.

Nearly 200 Fleet trainers and De Havilland Tiger Moth planes out of the 800 required for the plan have been ordered and are being built in Canada. By the end of the year the whole order will be completed.

For more advanced training, Harvards, Fleet 60s and Ansons will be used and orders have been placed in Canada and the United States for more than 800 Harvards—a low-wing, high-speed aircraft highly popular with pilots at Ontario air stations, where they have been used for the past six months.

Some Harvards will be used instead of the Fairey battle planes which were to come from England. To replace Harvards diverted in this manner, orders for 200 Fleet 60s for battle pilot training have been placed.

There will be 1,500 Ansons constructed and nine Canadian plants are contributing to the production of this type of plane the largest used in the training plan. A score of Ansons are in service now at Camp Borden and Trenton air stations. The Federal Aircraft Limited of Montreal, with Mr. Bell as president, has been formed to co-ordinate way from Brest to St. Jean De Luz.

Gen. Charles De Gaulle, leader of the "free Frenchmen" who want to fight on at Britain's side, declared that "already several ships and air groups" had joined "free French naval forces" which will stand with their Allies.

Extension of the blockade of French ports, to keep goods out of German hands, was announced in the House of Commons. Whether it so will be applied to the French coast will not be decided until their status has clarified.

## ENEMY SUBS FARE BADLY; FOUR SUNK

LONDON, July 2.—(CP)—The admiralty announced today that Nazi submarines have been preying on Allied commerce in increased numbers, aided by Italian submarines in the Mediterranean and also possibly in the Atlantic.

The enemy continues to pay a heavy toll for these successes, however. Sinking of four Italian submarines was announced today, their destruction being achieved in the eastern Mediterranean between June 27 and June 29. This brings to 13 the total of Italian submarines sunk since that country declared war.

An Italian destroyer, the *Espresso*, was sunk in the Eastern Mediterranean.

It was disclosed that in the week ended June 23 a total of 88,250 tons of Allied shipping had been destroyed. These losses were described as "admittedly heavy" but it was announced that in actual tonnage Britain is better off than when the war began because of new construction, captures and transfers to her registry of craft of her Allies.

W. A. Currie Is Named District Gov. Of Y's Men

At the conclusion of the business session of the Maritime convention of Y's Men's Clubs, which opened on Monday at Summerside, Mr. W. A. Currie, Summerside, was appointed District Governor, replacing the retiring District Governor, R. G. Laughlin, Fredericton.

Rev. A. Commons Committee Recommends Death Penalty For Treason

OTTAWA, July 2.—(CP)—Recognizing the infamous "fifth column" peril, the Commons committee on the defence of Canada today recommended to Parliament the death penalty for certain treasonable activities and life imprisonment for others.

In a preliminary report the committee proposed provisions "some what similar" to those enacted by the United Kingdom in the Treachery Act of 1940.

Today the committee recommended that the death penalty be imposed for knowingly assisting to the enemy's forces, for impeding the forces of His Majesty and endangering life, acts less serious and likely to assist the enemy, to prejudice the safe defence of the defence of Canada or to interfere with the efficient prosecution of the war might be punishable by life imprisonment.

In the preamble to the report the committee recognized that it is common knowledge the enemy conducted treasonable and dangerous activities in countries with which he was at war, commonly known as "fifth column" activities.

The committee's report, tabled by Revenue Minister Isley, chairman read in part:

"Your committee is of the opinion that there are two classes of acts which should be separately defined and created as offences, and for which punishments more severe than those which can be imposed under the present law should be provided.

"These classes are:

"1. Acts done with intent to help the enemy and designed or likely to give assistance to the operations of the enemy, to impede operations of the naval, military or air operations of His Majesty's forces, or to endanger life.

"2. Acts done with intent to help the enemy but which include those of a somewhat less grave character, being acts likely to assist the enemy or to prejudice the safe defence of the defence of Canada or the efficient prosecution of the war."

The report continued, "the acts mentioned in paragraph one... were made capital offences by an act passed by the Parliament of the United Kingdom... and the acts mentioned in paragraph one if done in the United Kingdom would be offences against the defence regulations and would carry a maximum penalty of life imprisonment."

## CANADA TO CARRY ON AIR SCHEME ALONE

Original Two-Year Plan Telescoped Into One Year; Plane Production Speeded Greatly.

OTTAWA, July 2.—(CP)—Confident the growing Canadian aircraft industry will meet the new demands, Munitions Minister Howe announced today the Government will be able to complete both the Canadian and the whole British Commonwealth air training production program without overseas assistance.

The larger part of the original scheme, which covered two years, has now been telescoped into a one-year plan, he said. Elementary training planes are being manufactured on a mass production basis and construction of advanced trainers is proceeding in accord with needs of the accelerated schedule.

The Minister's statement was the major development in a day which produced several other air announcements, indicating the new emphasis being placed on Canada taking the predominant role in bolstering the Empire's air strength.

Mr. Howe also announced that R. P. Bell of Halifax, has been appointed to the executive committee of the munitions and supply department with responsibility of co-ordinating aircraft production in Canada and accelerating output. He serves without remuneration.

The Munitions Minister's statement coincided with an announcement in London by Air Secretary Sir Charles B. Grahame regarding the appointment of Air Vice Marshal A. G. R. Garrod, as Director of Aviation Training under a new plan to speed output of trained pilots and flying personnel.
