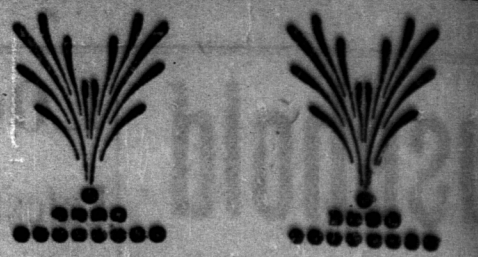

### SIDE AND PRINCE CO.

FRIDAY was a gala day in Summerside. Early in the morning the news of the relief of Kimberly set all the available flags fluttering in the breeze. At night the announcement came of the Crystals' victory in Charlottetown winning them the Senior Hockey Championship of the Island, while two small Summerside contingents had inflicted a crushing defeat on two St. Eleanor's teams in a game of Hockey in Crystal Rink. The affair in Crystal Rink was a pretty big one considering the size of the teams pitted against each other. The Second Pioneers vs First St. Eleanor's, resulted in a score of 11 to 3, in favor of the former. The Defenders of Summerside vs Second St. Eleanor's, 6 to 2, in favor of former. There were about 150 present and the boys played splendidly. Both St. Eleanor's teams put up a good fight and with a little more practice will soon no doubt be able to take a stand against any of the crack teams of the Island. After the game the Pioneers entertained the visiting teams to an oyster supper at the Railway Dining Room where they enjoyed a happy hour together. On arrival of the special from Charlottetown, Mr. and Mrs. Grady the popular host and hostess of the Rail-Dining Room, invited the Champion Hockeyists of the Island—the Crystals—and regaled them with a generous feast. The boys are loud in their praises of the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Grady and will no doubt remember this generous act as long as they are able to wield a hockey stick.

The civic meeting in Market Hall, Friday night, while perhaps not as large as on former occasions, was one that must have been very gratifying to those who have at heart the best interests of the town. Mr. David Rogers was appointed to the chair, and after briefly stating the object of the meeting called upon Mayor Campbell. The Mayor gave a short resume of the year's work, giving a clear and straightforward statement of the financial situation during the year, as outlined in the civic year book just issued. He dealt with needed improvements—street repairing the necessity of increasing the efficiency of our water supply for fire protection, suggesting the building of additional tanks, etc.

He was followed by Councillor Wood who after reviewing the financial operations of the Council introduced the C. T. A. question, which he said was successfully worked by the present council as by any of its predecessors. He was in the field again for the coming election, and if returned would do his best to serve the interests of citizens. Councillors Nuttall and Sobey followed, each claiming that while the financial affairs were more economically administered than by former Councils, they had collected as much revenue from the C. T. A. as any of their predecessors.

Messrs. Geo. W. Warren J. A. Brace, W. B. Ramsay briefly addressed the meeting, and while giving the present Council due credit for economy in the material affairs of the town, criticized them somewhat severely in their neglect of the Canada Temperance Act.

Mr. W. R. C. McLeod followed. In reference to the Mayor's suggestions for street improvements he thought that in future whatever improvements were undertaken should be with a view to more permanency. If only a little were done yearly let it be so done right, it would be more economical in the end. He opposed any further outlay on tanks for fire protection. The question of a proper system of waterworks was now within the range of practical civic politics and any outlay made without that in view would be unadvisable. He spoke of other needed improvements, dealing at considerable length with our transportation facilities, harbor improvements, etc. He scored somewhat severely the action of the Hon. Minister of Marine for non fulfillment of promises made in this hall on the eve of a recent election when citizens were given to understand that an honest effort was about to be made to test the practicability of the Summerside Cape Tormentine route. That promise is now frozen in the ice at Pictou. He commended the administration of the present council but criticized their handling of the C. T. A. He believed he was voicing the best sentiments of the town when he said there was culpable neglect in this matter. He thought the police should be under the direct supervision of the Mayor and Stipendiary Magistrate and should in no way be interfered with by the councillors.

Mr. R. Hunt gave a short address in which while giving the council credit for economy and care, he said the financial statement was not as clear as it should be in some particulars. There were some things left out that citizens had a right to be informed of, such as the price of lumber furnished, a detailed statement of the default account, &c.

Mr. Allan McKinnon instituted some comparisons between the expenditure of the past and former years. Rev. E. J. Grant next followed with an admirable though short address, while rejoicing with others on the material prosperity of the town, and the splendid financial showing of the present council he deplored the fact that the C. T. A. had been used only as a revenue producing machine. He could not offer a greater insult to the intelligence of citizens than to say this was their primary object in passing the act, and believed that if the act failed to reduce the drink traffic to a minimum it was the fault of the incoming council he would say that in the enforcement of the C. T. A. they would have his hearty support and the support of every citizen who had the welfare of the town at heart. Mr. Grant was enthusiastically applauded.

Rev. W. H. Smith also addressed the meeting. He complimented the Council on their good showing for the year just closed, but he thought there was much left undone. If an effort has been made to enforce the C. T. A. the effort has failed. If it was used as a revenue producer the result may be as creditable as under former administrations, but as a citizen he would shrink from such a view of it. He did not see why we should reap a revenue from the vices of our fellow citizens. He thought a revenue sufficient for the funds of the town could be raised in a legitimate way. He was not bold enough to look into Summerside homes and see the moral effect of the one thousand dollars of revenue reaped during the year from the traffic. He believed the act could be enforced, and that the Council that succeeded in stamping out the traffic would win the gratitude of all citizens, and that many who are now living under its baneful influence would walk our streets as free men, and would thank God that they were free from the accursed traffic.

Rev. D. J. G. McDonald also spoke in the same strain. He criticized the attitude of the Council to the C. T. A. and thought that an honest effort, supported by honest citizens would result in a satisfactory enforcement of the Act.

Mr. J. A. Brace, moved, seconded by Mr. G. E. Baker that the thanks of the citizens be tendered the Mayor and Councillors for the manner in which they conducted the financial affairs of the Town. Meeting closed.
