The Need of Continued Help

Canada today is within easy bombing range of German bombers from bases in Norway, according to 30-year-old 2nd Lieut. Nicolas Van Stein, Belgian artillery officer who is now in Canada after being a prisoner of the Nazis in Belgium and a prisoner of Vichy France in Dakar. Pointing out to Canadians the importance of supporting the Dominion's second Victory Loan if this country is to have sufficient

military, naval and air force strength to protect itself, the Belgian officer declared that people in this country must not feel they are safe from the horrors of war.

Now serving with the Belgian army built at Joliette Camp in Quebec, Lieut. Van Stein declared the German Junkers 88, four motor bombers now stationed in Norway, could fly from Norway to Halifax and back with ease and have a couple of hours on this side of the Atlantic for bombing. That, he says, is how close war is to Canada.

Lieut. Van Stein has had several close-ups of war. As an artillery officer in the Belgian army he saw the bombing of Liege and Namur and he saw thousands of civilian refugees killed on the roads by Nazi fliers. Early in 1939 he fled from Belgium into occupied France and finally worked his way to Marseilles. From there he sailed to Dakar where he arrived on January 27 and was kept prisoner aboard ship until June 3, along with refugees from Poland, Belgian and Czechoslovakia.

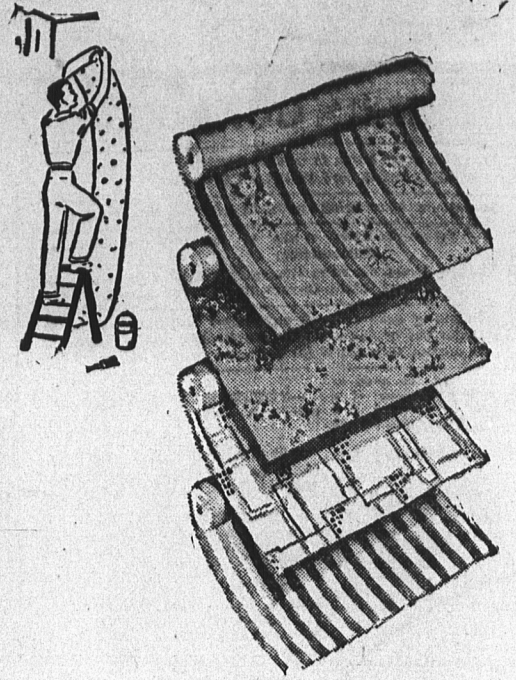

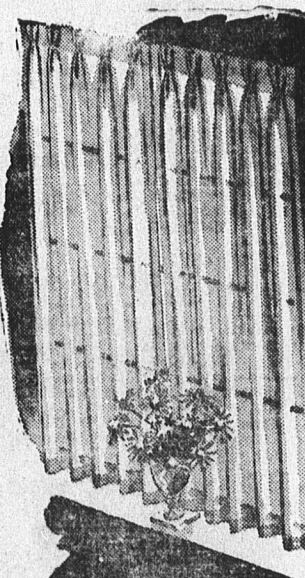

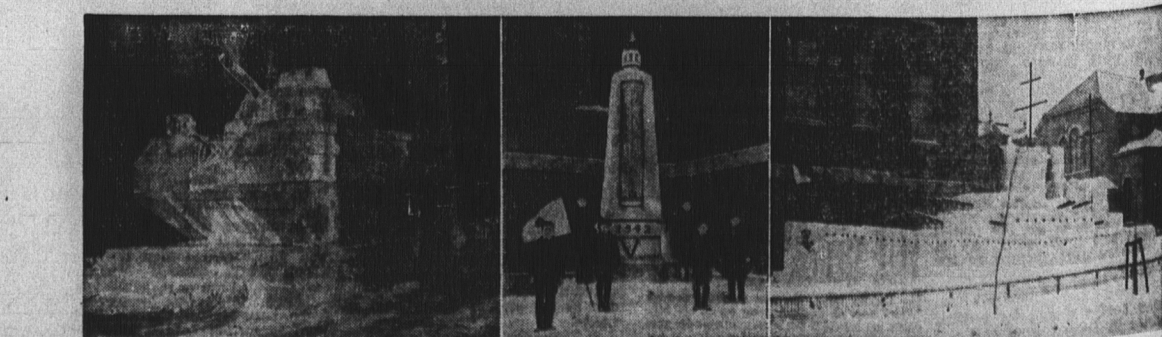

Presbytery of P.E.I.

The Presbytery of P.E.I. convened yesterday morning in Zion Church Hall with the Rev. A. O. Thomson, D.D., Moderator, in the chair. There were present the Rev. G. C. Webster (Clerk), T. H. Russell Somers, T. W. Goodwill, H. M. Creaser, H. M. Buntain and Dr. J. Keir Fraser, together with elders from congregations all over the Island.

Dealing with the problems of Home Missions the Presbytery decided to apply for Student Missions for the following congregations: Alberton, Caledonia, Wood Islands, Murray Harbour South, Murray Harbour, Tryon and Breadalbane, and Peter's Road and to secure the services of an ordained Graduate for the congregation of Marshfield. Dealing with the vacant charges, the Presbytery amalgamated the congregations of Malpeque and Kensington where candidates for a call are soon to be heard as well as at Belfast, Montague and Cardigan. The Rev. H. M. Creaser, B.A., was appointed Stated Supply to the Tyne Valley charge for one year.

Encouraging reports were presented on Young People's work by the convener, Rev. H. M. Buntain, on Statistics by Rev. T. W. Goodwill, on the Budget by Rev. T. H. B. Somers who stated the Presbytery had contributed \$4,500 more to missions in 1941 than in 1940. Dr. Fraser was appointed convener of the colleges committee and to him was referred the application of a candidate for the Ministry The Rev. A. O. MacPhail again made application through the Presbytery to be received by the General Assembly.

Reporting for the Committee on Social Service, Mr. Webster drew the attention of the Court to the progress made in the establishing of a Fair Wage Law in this Province of which movement the Presbytery approved.

Assembly matters consisted of the nomination of the Reverend Daniel J. Fraser, D.D., LL.D., Professor in The Presbyterian College, Montreal, for the Moderatorship of the General Assembly; the naming of the Rev. G. C. Webster and T. W. Goodwill with two elders as Commissioners to the General Assembly in Montreal in June and the nomination of the following men to the Assembly Boards of the Church: Rev. G. C. Webster (Home Missions); Rev. T. H. B. Somers (Boards of Administration and Education); Dr. J. K. Fraser, (Senate of Presbyterian College); Rev. H. M. Buntain, (Board of Presbyterian College); Rev. H. M. Creaser (Board of Knox College) and Rev. T. W. Goodwill (Historical Committee).

The Presbytery adjourned to meet in the Kirk Hall on May 12th.

Dr. Silliphant is a son of Mr. Ambrose Silliphant and a brother of Mrs. J. W. Patterson of Hunter River and Mrs. Sherman MacDuff of Brookfield. He taught school here and at Kensington. His wife and two small daughters reside at Long Beach, Calif. The best wishes of all residents of Hunter River go out to "Billy" at this time.
