Cuban Banker Renounces His Retirement Check

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26 - Criticism of his retirement pay today led Albert H. Wiggin, for years head of the Chase National Bank to surrender his \$100,000-a-year-for-life cheque in a surprise announcement to the United States Senate Banking Committee.

Interupting the presentation of a mounting pile of evidence of the profits and risks in the Cuban operations of the \$2,000,000 financial house, Ferdinand Pecora, its counsel, put into the committee record without comment a letter from Mr. Wiggin to the bank board giving up his annuity.

Concurrently with a meeting of the Chase board in New York to accept Mr. Wiggin's proposal, Pecora developed in questioning Shepard Morgan, a Chase vice president, that the bank floated \$40,000,000 in Cuban bonds in United States with knowledge of a Cuban treasury deficit and financial troubles.

FAMOUS ROYAL SOOT TRAIN RETURNING HOME

MONTREAL, Que. Oct. 26 - The famous Royal Soot, express train of the London, Midland and Scottish Railway will soon return to Canada en route to Britain and will visit various towns and cities where opportunity will be given for Canadians to inspect this famous flyer as it runs over the lines of the Canadian National Railways from Chicago to Montreal. On arrival at Montreal the train will be dismantled, loaded into a steamship and returned to Britain. It is due to arrive in Montreal on Sunday, November 12th and the following day will be moved to the railway shops for dismantling preparatory to loading on steamship.

NAVY CIVIL LORD MAKES FAST TRIP

LONDON, Oct. 24 - (G.P.): An official tour of naval establishments in the Far East, on which he will cover 30,000 miles, has been begun by Captain Fuan Wallace in his capacity as Civil Lord of the Admiralty. He expects to return in 51 days.

Proposing their resignation after their declaration of office at the Guildhall, Sir Ernest Wild, K. C., Recorder of London said: "The two new sheriffs have the distinction of belonging to the great Jewish race. Great Britain owes a tremendous debt of gratitude to the Jews. We think of names like Benjamin Disraeli, Lord Rothschild and Lord Reading. The city and this country generally have nothing to do with politics, faith or creed. The city judges a man by his merits."

The Fall Shoe

NEW YORK, Oct. 26 - A high-cut, centre-buckled shoe with a single broad strap, alligator vamps and suede quarters is achieving popularity as a walking shoe this Fall. It is one of a multitude of new styles and new materials shown in women's footwear.

For campus wear by college girls, the season will be just a case of ghillies-heavy, well-soled ones, with almost no heels. These also are made in alligator and suede, a combination that is finding high favor.

For spectator sportswear is shown the high-cut, five eyelet oxford, with alligator tips and foxings.

Women who wish to wear the typically British, in keeping with the new influence in sports clothing, are obtaining glaze kid oxfords with double fringed, or "kiltie" tongue, in either silver or eel gray or in mahogany buckskin. Another shoe for the same purpose is the standard styled pile calf oxford tie, with lizard tip and facing.

Pumps and strapped sandals vie for popularity for afternoon wear. There is the brown suede or vici kid pump with graduated strips of leather applied in rows from toe to instep, and across sides of the quarters. A gold buckle ornaments the front.

A brown kid pump with an oval cut out just above the toes has a "fled" appearance by means of two narrow gold-outlined strips of the same leather, which overlap each other as well as partially hiding the oval.

Most T-shaped afternoon sandals are of solid black or brown antelope, although some eel gray suedes, buckskins and kids are shown.

For pastel shaded evening gowns, silk and/or brocaded sandals with silver and gold trimmings are popular. If the dress is one of the new deep rich velvets, the white or neutral sandal can be dyed the color of the gown.

MANITOBA HONEY PRODUCERS

WINNIPEG, Oct. 26 - (C.P.) - Manitoba led all provinces of the Dominion in the value of bee imports from United States during April, May and June, according to a report from C. W. Gooderham, Dominion apiarist who has just completed a tour of the country. The Ottawa conference of last year has benefited Canadian honey producers, Mr. Gooderham said, because of the preference given producers of seven shillings per hundredweight. The United Kingdom imports 8,000,000 pounds of honey annually. Canada's share of that has been low, he said, but the Dominion has made the most steady and persistent gains of any exporting countries.

PRAIRIE STEPPES OF CANADA

The term prairies, as applied to the Canadian Northwest, is a comprehensive one, and is used to denote all that lower portion of the Great Plains region north of the 49th parallel found within the confines of the three western provinces, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. Commencing some fifty miles east of Winnipeg, at the western edge of the Laurentian area, it extends westward to the foothills of the Rockies, though it must not be supposed that this immense stretch of country, some 800 miles if measured near the southern boundaries of these provinces, is one continuous, uninterrupted prairie or plain. It is rather a series of three great levels or steppes, marked off by more or less distinct lines of escarpment which frequently take the form of ridges and wooded hills.

The first and lowest of these prairie levels is that of the Red River Valley with an elevation of about 800 feet above the sea. Its northern portion is occupied by the Winnipeg group of lakes, and to the south of Lake Winnipeg it comprises some 7000 square miles of prairie land, which to the eye is absolutely flat although the former

Maritime Fishermen Hold Convention In Moncton

(Canadian Press) MONCTON, Oct. 25 - A proposal that Canada give permission for free entry of lobsters into this country from the United States, was made at the fourth annual convention of the Maritime United Fishermen which opened a two-day session in City Hall here this morning, and a resolution to this effect will be submitted before the convention tomorrow by Norman Solows, Vice-President of the U. M. F. The resolution, it was said, will be in the nature of a gesture of good-will with the hope in view the United States may not erect higher barriers in the form of a tariff wall, in the way of Maritime fish entering that country as indicated in recent despatches. Another high light of the opening day of the convention which is attended by about 60 delegates from the shores of the Maritime Provinces and Magdalen Islands, was a highly interesting and inspiring address by Rev. Dr. H. J. Coady, of Antigonish. In an address delivered this morning which occupied about one hour, Rev. Dr. Coady welcomed the delegates and made a stirring appeal to the fishermen for continued activity.
