Proceedings in The Legislature

the bill, and that it was not customary to furnish bills before they were introduced.

HON. MR. ARSENAULT replied that the House was asked to suspend the rule and that it was certainly the right of any member to refuse consent to a bill until the information was supplied. The press might have gone further and said that he could exercise his parliamentary right in this matter, but that he DID exercise it.

HON. MR. CROSBY rose to continue the debate on the Budget address. He reviewed his statements made at the previous evening's session. He contended that earth roads, such as the Government constructed last year, are essentially permanent roads and the best for this province. While the former government had made many promises with regard to public works they had performed, he said, very little. They had attempted to make revenue and expenditure meet, but they didn't do it. They had failed to improve the condition of our teachers, and they had failed in many other respects. He declared that the sins of omission of the late Government were many and great. Good intentions they may have had, but it availed not. Amid gratifying applause from the Government benches Mr. Crosby quoted the time-honored definition of good intentions which had reference to paving stones along a certain Road not listed in the Government Highways projects.

MR. JAS. McINTYRE suggested that when a man enters politics he should apply to himself a coat of oil, so that when cold water was thrown on him it would run off. He answered criticism of his absence at last session, explaining illness in his family, followed later by a death, in justification for what appeared to be inattention to his duties. He also referred to a meeting in his district of which he was not advised in time to conveniently be present, and at which things were done that would not have taken place had he been there. He made special reference to the road work, a portion of which, he was glad to say, was going to be constructed in his district. He spoke also of the information he had received of the good work done at the Experimental Farm. He was prepared to take his full responsibility for the increase in cost of indemnity, \$500 was not too much, he claimed, and no man would ever get rich on it. He volubly praised the leader of the Government, who, he said was always at his post of duty.

MR. PETER BIDDIE stood out for the right of public discussion. For his own part, he considered it the right of all parties to criticize their opponents. He eulogized the leader of the Government for the manner in which he carried out his political program. He referred to the pre-election promises with regard to taxation, explaining that at that time the people were not as well informed as they might have been. He believed that the Poll Tax should be reduced to \$2.00. The road work was reviewed by him at considerable length. He made strong references to the cost of repairs to these roads which will be a big cost to the tax payers of the country for maintenance. He also advocated one main truck line of roads with branch lines connecting as the most suitable system. The money borrowed for road purposes he believed should be borrowed from our own people after the manner of the Victory Loan. Regarding the increase of salary members he was of the same opinion yet. With the falling price of products, with clothing, boots and other things coming down, the Province, he believed, would not be satisfied with indemnity increase. He had no complaint to make of the press. They generally reported him fairly in the papers, he said.

MR. H. D. McLEAN then took the floor and criticized at some length the work done on the roads. He expressed the hope that the Commissioner of Public Works would leave a better monument than the roads constructed under the supervision of his Department. The Government has heavily increased the burden of taxation and this burden has not all fallen upon the wealthy of the country, as the honorable members on the opposite side try to make out. Mr. McLean quoted from the Report of the Auditor to show that the farmers' taxes have been greatly increased. Nor is there much improvement in the public service to show for the greater amount of money the people have paid into the public treasury. The present Government before they came into power, were very loud in claiming their ability to carry on the affairs of the country with the revenue on hand. The honorable member for Charlottetown (Mr. Higgs) had taken great exception to having a report broadcast through the country that the Province had gone behind \$100,000. It could be easily shown

however, that last year, if it had not been for the revenues belonging to the Conservative party, the Government would have gone behind to that amount. If it was a crime to publish a statement of this kind, how much greater a crime was it to publish a statement that the Province was behind \$253,000 in 1919. The speaker went on to refer to the financial situation, as well as to the circumstances under which the minority report of the Public Accounts Committee had been arbitrarily ruled out at the end of last session. In amendment to the motion to go into supply he moved a resolution, seconded by Mr. Kennedy which is published in another column of the Guardian. At 1 p. m. Mr. Metherell moved the adjournment of the debate. The House adjourned until 3 p. m. Monday.

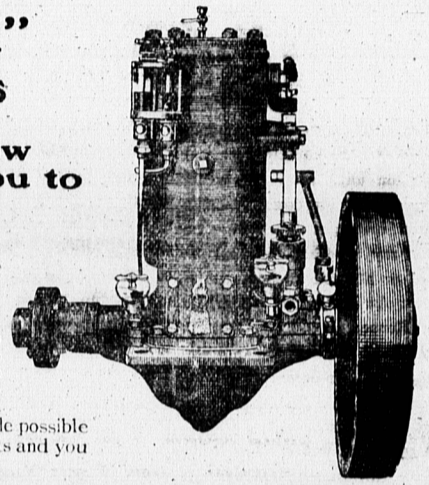
