ELECTED SUPERVISOR IN SAN MATEO COUNTY - Defeating an incumbent who had served as Supervisor in San Mateo County California, for a number of years Fred E. MILK DEALERS

It feasible. Several speakers took part in a discussion as to the cost of production and the number of farmers supplying milk. In reply to a question as to the present retail price of milk in Charlottetown it was stated that milk sells for 8, 7, 6, or in some cases as low as 5 cents a quart. It was also questioned whether some stores are not selling milk at a low rate as a sales leader. Mr. Shaw pointed out that in other provinces where there are marketing regulations, stores, hotels or restaurants are not allowed to sell lower than one cent below the retail trade. It was pointed out in this connection that the biggest problem to be dealt with in this city is the unfair competition of stores. In some cases the milk is bought for 4 1-2 cents and sold for 5 cents a quart.

Mr. G. E. Full suggested that the milk producers and vendors might get together with the City Fathers and by means of license regulations work out some plan whereby control of price could be exercised.

Mr. Shaw pointed out that before the Marketing Board can do anything a scheme must be presented. The question was asked if milk vendors want to sell milk at a certain price can they be prevented.

Mr. Shaw explained that if a plan is passed by the Federal Marketing Board it certainly can be enforced anywhere.

Mr. Brown, York, pointed out that it costs more to produce milk from registered herds than from grade herds.

Mr. Walter James, Bunbury, who was asked by the chairman to express his opinion, stated that it is doubtful if anything can be done by the City Fathers. He cited the method of barn inspection in other provinces. In order to have similar inspection here a full time man would be required.

Dr. Crokin explained the barn and herd inspection practices here. Stables are inspected yearly. Herds are also inspected as to physical condition. A great improvement is noticeable since inspection started ten or twelve years ago, stated Dr. Crokin.

Mr. Earl Ings, Mr. Herbert, suggested that the meeting go down to plain facts and figures. Considerable discussion by several speakers followed. The chairman suggested that a committee of eight be appointed to confer with the Provincial Marketing Board and the City of Charlottetown. If a satisfactory plan cannot be worked out, then draft a scheme and present it to the Federal Marketing Board.

Mr. J. J. Trainor suggested that the milk producers organize along the lines of labor unions. The difficulty, Mr. Trainor pointed out, is that the selling is done in competition and not co-operatively. He suggested that the producers refuse to sell to stores that are selling at a cut rate.

It was moved by Mr. Rodd, seconded by Mr. Wood that a committee composed of eight (this was changed to 9 later) be appointed to confer together with the Provincial Marketing Board, with the City Council. The committee to consist of four producers, two raw milk and two pasteurized milk vendors.

Mr. Morrow, Dairy Superintendent, suggested that hot headed men not be put on committee. As a consumer, he stated that at ten cents a quart milk is the cheapest food that can be bought in Charlottetown.

The committee was made up as follows: Messrs. Calvin Wood, Cross Roads; Guy Rodd, Harrington; Sidney Taylor, Winsloe, and Earl Ings, Mt. Herbert, to represent the producers. Messrs. Eugene Cullen, Royalty, and Wendell Mutch, Bunbury, to represent the raw milk vendors. Messrs. Chester Cox, Charlottetown; Percy Gray, Charlottetown, and Harold Hearz, Marshfield, to represent the pasteurized milk vendors.

At the close of the meeting the committee met with members of the Provincial Marketing Board. A meeting is to be arranged, with the City Council when certain proposals will be placed before them for consideration. The milk producers and vendors will then be called together to adopt any agreement arrived at.
