BRITONS SEEK (Continued from page 1)  
The whole story has not come from the battlefields but from available information military experts draw these conclusions—  
1. Lt.-Gen. Neil M. Ritchie, commander of the British 8th Army, lacked sufficient numbers of United States 28-ton tanks. When the 88-millimetre guns of the Germans knocked many of them out of action British forces had to depend too much on light cruiser tanks whose two-pounder guns have been relegated to the peacetime class.  
2. The allies still have lessons to learn about tank tactics, and bravery cannot be substituted for the tank skill.  
3. Air power over desert battlefields cannot be made the dominant factor. The R. A. F. started with air superiority and still has the bombing and strafing of some hundreds of others get through.  
4. Establishment of a strong defence line anywhere in Crete in the vicinity of El Alamein is out of the question because of limitations on the number of troops which can be maintained in the desert.
