A RIVER OF FISH

Hundreds of Bass Frozen in the Ice.

THE KILDARE RIVER.

The Scene of Excitement—The Catcher will Realize Thousands of Dollars.

The big storm of last week was very severe in the western end of the Island and resulted in a curious and unprecedented state of affairs at Kildare. A heavy wind and high tide forced a deep body of lully ashore in Kildare River, when the tide receded the lully formed into ice, and it was discovered that a lot of large fish were imprisoned therein. One Montrose farmer on Saturday drove into Alberton with a sleigh load of what turned out to be splendid sea bass weighing from 10 to 30 pounds each and he realized \$40 for his morning's work. This caused quite an excitement and the ice in the river has since been prospected by the majority of the Montrose and Kildare people. Many of them are shipping their catch to New York where it is expected the fish will bring from 18 to 20 cents per pound. Other fish such as smelts and eels are also found in the ice in large quantities; but the chief interest centres in the bass which are splendid fish and very valuable. There is much speculation as to whether these fish were driven in by the storm or came in the river to spawn. In the latter case they probably were there in other years unnoticed for the reason that no one looked for them.

A gentleman who arrived in Alberton from Montrose on Monday evening, said that a great many people were on the ice and it was estimated that 1,800 bass had been taken that day. Taking New York prices as a basis that day's catch should net the people an aggregate of \$2,500. The fish are of large size and in good condition and would probably average 15 pounds each. Bass were found in Kildare River some years ago but in very small quantities and it has never been suspected that they would winter there. In quality they are very fine, far ahead of any other fresh fish that can be procured at this season and the catch is quite a windfall for the people living near Kildare River.

THE schooner Clifton arrived in Alberton yesterday from St. John's, Nfld., via Port Hood, C. B., repairing and coaling. She will be loaded for St. John's, Nfld., with a general cargo by Mr. Robert Orsbie.

OWING to the inclemency of the weather last evening the meeting called for the purpose of discussing educational questions was postponed. Dr. Anderson has kindly consented to return to Summerside and hold the meeting some time in January.

The steamer is still plying on this route and is likely to for some days to come. It seems quite strange that the people of Moncton are not better informed about communication between this Island and mainland. It would be a good idea if the press of the Railway city would keep their readers posted in regard to the connection between these two provinces particularly at this season of the year.
