TAX CUT

In fact, some veteran observers felt that the speech was of the type which a government, planning to go to the country, the life of parliament, does not expect until 1950, but there has been speculation that an election will be held in June or October.

The speech of the election runner-up was followed by an unusual mention in the speech of the budget for the 1949-50 fiscal year.

"Prosperous conditions now prevailing are being reflected in the buoyant level of national revenue, a condition to which due consideration is being given by my ministers in the preparation of forthcoming budgetary proposals."

The reference was interpreted as meaning that the government is planning or is hopeful of making tax reductions.

Other forecasts Among other things the speech forecast:

1. Broadening of the scope of family allowances legislation. 2. Abolition of appeals to the Privy Council in London and the establishment of the Supreme Court of Canada as the country's highest tribunal. 3. Establishment of a royal commission to examine into the activities of government agencies dealing with radio, films, television, arts, sciences and the like.

4. Legislation to provide for government loans to basic steel producers. 5. A bill to establish a Department of Reconstruction and Development to replace the existing Reconstruction and Supply Department. 6. Ratification of the St. Lawrence deep waterway agreement if the pact is ratified by the United States Congress. 7. Provision of a federal assistance for construction of a trans-Canada highway. 8. Extension of foreign exchange, rent and some price controls.

9. Legislation providing for ratification of the Geneva trade agreements and food agreements with the United Kingdom. 10. A measure to provide for use of a "Canada standard" label on Canadian-made goods to prevent deception of the public.

The 2,000-word speech said there would be bills respecting foreign communications, overseas tele-communications, the control and international pipe lines and assistance for the Canadian ship-building industry.

Terms were agreed to enter confederation as a 10th province with the submitted to parliament "without delay." Target date for union has been set for March 31.

Family Allowances In most cases the speech made mention of the forthcoming legislation without giving any details. On family allowances, the speech said:

"A bill will be introduced to broaden the scope of the Family Allowances Act, as a further in-crease of the policy of the government to social security and human welfare designed to assure the greatest possible measure of social justice for all Canadians."

It is believed that the bill will provide for equal family allowances for all children regardless of the size of the family. The bill is expected to be introduced in the fifth and subsequent children in a family of more than four.
